PROVISION OF REQUESTED INFORMATION

Thank you for your request for information about dogs seized at borders which we received on 06 November 2020. Your request has been handled under the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (FOI).

The information you requested and our response is detailed below:

"May I ask the following of APHA

For 2018, 2019 and 2020 so far, can you tell me the number of dogs seized by APHA (Animal and Plant Health Agency)

1 / at the UK border

2/ at the border between England and Scotland

The Animal and Plant Health Agency are not responsible for enforcement. Trading Standards are the body responsible for enforcement, including the seizure and quarantine of dogs under the Rabies Importation Order. APHA do not carry out checks at the border between England and Scotland.

However since December 2015 APHA has been taking an intelligence-led approach at Dover aimed at disrupting the illegal importation of puppies and abuse of the Pet Travel Scheme. As part of this activity APHA is working with the Dogs Trust and Kent County Council to quarantine underage dogs intercepted at both Dover Port and Eurotunnel.

Data for dogs intercepted and quarantined as part of this scheme can be found below.

APHA is an Executive Agency of the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs and also works on behalf of the Scottish Government, Welsh Government and Food Standards Agency to safeguard animal and plant health for the benefit of people, the environment and the economy.

4/ Can you provide a narrative of APHA's work to prevent dogs/animals, for instance the objective of stopping cross-border animal trade."

Responsibility for stopping the illegal movement of dogs begins in the country of origin. When cases of illegal puppy movements under the Pet Travel Scheme are discovered, officials will raise instances of abuse of the scheme with the authorities in the relevant countries. It is APHA's responsibility to maintain effective border controls.

It is also important to recognise the illegal trafficking of dogs is ultimately driven by demand. Defra has published <u>guidance</u> on buying a pet. This guidance contains guidelines to follow when buying a dog such as buying from a reputable supplier and viewing the animal and its documentation, and also highlights the trade in illegal imports.

Defra also works closely with the Pet Advertising Advisory Group to drive up standards for online advertisements and make potential pet owners and website operators more aware of rogue dealers.

Information disclosed in response to this FOI request is releasable to the public. In keeping with the spirit and effect of the FOI and the government's Transparency Agenda, this letter and the information disclosed to you may be placed on GOV.UK, together with any related information that will provide a key to its wider context. No information identifying you will be placed on the GOV.UK website.
