The government is concerned about what they heard about victims of abuse, while they were working on the Domestic Abuse Act 2021. They heard real life stories through groups who support deaf people and people with disabilities.
The government wants to look into the protection and support for adults who could be abused by the people who care for them, when they are at home.

	The government wants people who have support in their own home to have good quality care. This includes stopping abuse.
Parliament	The Home Office and the Department of Health and Social Care will lead the review together. Other government departments and groups will also be involved.
	Aims of the review
	 To look at what is happening to protect people from being abused by the people who care for them, when they are at home. To look at the support available for people abused in their own home by the people who care for

them.

	The reason for the review
	Some people have said they are concerned about whether there is enough help where someone is abused in their own home by someone giving them care. In some cases, the abuse will not come under the definition of the Domestic Abuse Act. For example, if the care given and abuse is from a friend or neighbour.
	This review looks at what protection the law gives, and guidance for organisations who help protect people, like the police and social services.
	How the review will be done
	It will find out more from
Rights Disabled	 Victims and people who are deaf, have disabilities and older people, and groups who can speak up for them. Experts in the criminal justice system and safeguarding adults. This includes social services and the police.



It will look at what protection and support is available for people who have care and support at home.




It will work with the different government departments to make sure they are all working in the same way. These include the Home Office, the Department of Health and Social Care, the Cabinet office and Ministry of Justice.


The size of the review

Report	The review will have a report on everything it finds out at the end.
	About people in their own home. This means a person's permanent home. It could be rented, provided by the local authority or owned.
Support	And they have care and support to live independently with people providing care.
	It does not include abuse in care homes as these come under the







It will look at justice for adults at risk of abuse in their own homes, if it is a criminal offence. It will look at how victims can get an order to help stop more abuse from happening.



It will look at whether the legislation in the Care Act 2014 works in real life to keep people safe.
