Message from Chief Planner

This newsletter provides an update on yesterday's announcements regarding nutrient pollution, which is having an adverse effect on some rivers and waterbodies in the catchments of Habitats Sites.

Yesterday, Natural England issued advice on Habitats Sites that are in an unfavourable conservation status and where additional nutrient loads, such as from development, may have an adverse effect.

Further information via links to published material is provided below, including what this means for the areas and local authorities affected and the funding and support available to local authorities from the Planning Advisory Service (PAS).

We will continue to monitor the impact of these changes and how we can best support those affected.
