CONSULTATION ON ISSUES ARISING FROM THE CIVIL PROCEDURE RULE COMMITTEE CONSIDERATION OF THE IMPLEMENTATION OF FIXED RECOVERABLE COSTS IN CIVIL CASES

Overview and Background

On 6 September 2021, the Government published its consultation response on extending fixed recoverable costs (FRC) to all civil cases in the fast track (i.e. generally those up to £25,000 in damages), and to simpler 'intermediate' cases (up to £100,000 in damages). This follows the 2019 consultation paper, *Extending Fixed Recoverable Costs in Civil Cases: Implementing Sir Rupert Jackson's Proposals*, which was based on Sir Rupert's 2017 report on FRC. Since publication, the Government has been working with the Civil Procedure Rule Committee (CPRC) on the draft rules to ensure the smooth delivery of these reforms. Over the course of this work issues have emerged on (i) ensuring appropriate provisions for vulnerable parties and witnesses and (ii) a reconsideration of the rules around Qualified One-way Costs Shifting (QOCS) following the Supreme Court judgement in *Ho v Adelekun* [2021] UKSC 43.

We now invite views solely on the proposals and rule changes outlined in the two papers addressing the above issues. Any other issues relating to FRC more generally will not be considered as part of this consultation.
