## **GLO Compensation Scheme Advisory Board**

## Report of second meeting, held on 6 February 2023

Members present: Prof. Christopher Hodges (Chair); Lord Arbuthnot; Kevan Jones MP, Prof. Richard Moorhead.

Also present: Carl Creswell (BEIS), Eleri Wones (BEIS), Rob Brightwell (BEIS).

## **Project Review**

- 1. BEIS updated members on the project's progress.
  - Agreement had been reached with claimants' lawyers on a tariff for reasonable legal costs. This would be published shortly.
  - Procurement of claims facilitators and legal advisors were proceeding to plan. The BEIS internal team would shortly be at full strength.
  - Good progress was being made in discussions with claimants' lawyers and the Post Office about the practical arrangements through which the Post Office will disclose documents to claimants.

## Scheme documentation

- 2. The meeting reviewed
  - The Scheme Registration Form, which will provide the information about claimants which will trigger disclosures by the Post Office. This had been discussed with claimants' lawyers. [Post-meeting note: it has now been published along with the tariff of reasonable legal costs (see above) and a privacy notice at

https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/compensation-scheme-forgroup-litigation-order-case-postmasters];

- The draft Application Form, revised in the light of comments from claimants' legal representatives;
- The draft Scheme Principles and Guidance and supporting Q&A, which were to go to claimants' lawyers for comment shortly and would be published, with the application form, within a few weeks.
- 3. Members noted that the guidance said that awards should be fair, as well as respecting legal principles, and asked that the former point should be emphasised.
- 4. Members also asked for some clarification of the draft guidance in the interests of non-lawyers reading it. For instance it should deal more clearly with the issue of missing evidence, and should make clearer that claims can be made on behalf of deceased postmasters.
- 5. The Advisory Board agreed that GLO postmasters should be strongly encouraged to get independent legal advice, at no cost to themselves. BEIS confirmed that this was their intention.
- 6. Members made a number of other detailed comments on the documents. BEIS will take these into account as the documents are finalised.
