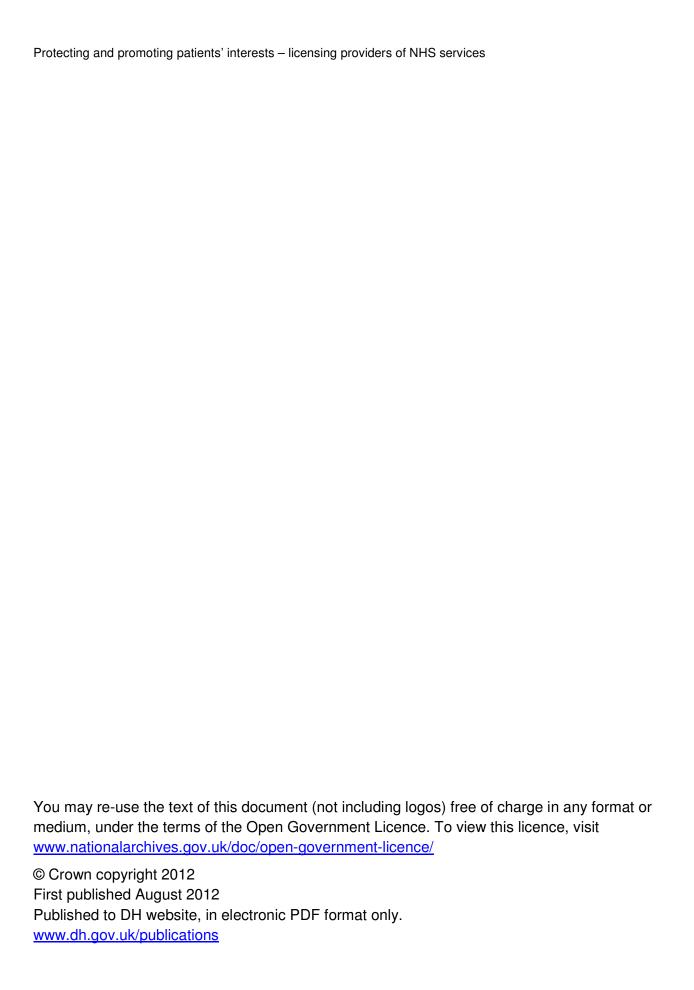

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Background

This document should be read in conjunction with the document entitled "Protecting and promoting patients" interests – licensing providers of NHS services— a consultation on the proposals". The Department of Health has launched a public consultation on the proposed regulations on Licensing of health providers and invites you to respond.

The Licensing consultation is about:

- who will need to hold a licence from a Monitor;
- the circumstances in which providers who are licensed can have a say in any changes to the standard conditions in their licence;
- the fines Monitor will be able to impose if a provider breaches its licence conditions, delivers services without a licence or fails to supply Monitor with required information.

Many modestly sized third sector providers will have NHS turnover of less than £10million, but may also have an excess of 50 employees if their entire UK staff are taken into account, including those who are not involved in provision of health services, (and in the current economic climate, many of whom may be part time posts). These "mid range" third sector bodies, of which Arthritis Care is one, would struggle to meet the administrative and financial pressures of a licensing regime that large private sector providers could easily absorb. Therefore, we recommend that only the £10million financial threshold for liability for licensing requirements be adopted. If Monitor are minded to adopt different criteria for third sector liability for the licensing regime, we recommend that the third sector be offered the opportunity to consult on it. General comments. If the third sector is to be subject to a licensing regime it must be proportionate to the capacity of the sector to meet the requirements of, i.e. enable potential provides to comply with the regime requirements without imposing an excessive burden on finances, staff resources or administrative hurdles, etc. It should not be likely to result in the sector being unfairly disadvantaged in terms of competing for contracts / AQP status against large private sector bodies. In principle we have no objection to a licensing regime that makes reasonable requirements with regard to quality standards of services, financial probity, being properly constituted, and general "fit and proper" probity tests, etc. However, there are some hurdles that would effectively shut the sector out from being able to compete with large private firms; requirements to hold large cash bonds or reserves is one example. Already there have been examples of third sector providers being unable to compete with large for – profit firms due to the imposition of financial preconditions (http://www.nursingtimes.net/nursing-practice/clinical-specialisms/district-andcommunity-nursing/900-nurses-in-virgin-community-services-deal/5043361.article) Another is such requirement is that of having expensive IT hard/software that are compatible with the NHS, already in place at the commencement of the tendering process. An alternative would be to allow potential bids from providers on the basis that if they won contracts of a certain size, relevant it infrastructure would be in place before contracts commenced, and the contract price would be sufficient to cover the full costs of delivery.
