Further breakdowns for serious proven re-offending of adult offenders in England and Wales released from custodial sentences of less than 12 months

Background

This ad-hoc statistical notice presents further breakdowns of already published information on proven re-offending.

Users should refer to the *Proven Re-offending Statistics Quarterly Bulletin* and accompanying *Definitions and Measurements* document (also available at the link above) for definitions of the terms used in this statistical notice, and for commentary to help interpret these results.

Table 1 in this statistical notice provides information on the number of adult offenders in England and Wales who were released from a custodial sentence of less than 12 months between 2000 and 2011 and went on to commit a serious proven re-offence. A proven re-offence is defined as any offence committed in a 12 month follow-up period and resulting in a court conviction, caution, reprimand or warning in either the 12 month follow-up period or within a further six month waiting period (to allow time for the offence to be proven in court).

These figures use a Home Office definition of serious offences; the list of offences included is set out in *Annex A* of the *Definitions and Measurement* document available at the link above. This classification is based on the definition used by a legacy Home Office performance indicator designed to support the delivery of public sector agreement 23: 'Make communities safer'.

^{5.} An offender is counted only once in the total which, therefore, does not equal the sum of 'serious violent or sexual' and 'serious acquisitive' (as a small number of offenders committed both types of serious re-offence)
