Overview

The World Food Programme is the world's largest humanitarian agency fighting hunger worldwide.

In emergencies, they get food to where it is needed, saving the lives of victims of war, civil conflict and natural disasters. After the cause of an emergency has passed, they use food to help communities rebuild.

WFP is part of the United Nations system and is voluntarily funded. On average, WFP reaches more than 90 million people with food assistance in 80 countries each year. About 13,500 people work for the organisation, most of them in remote areas, directly serving the hungry poor.

Strategic Plan

- 1. Save lives and protect livelihoods in emergencies;
- 2. Support food security and nutrition and rebuild livelihoods in fragile settings and following emergencies;
- Reduce risk and enable people, communities and countries to meet their own food and nutrition needs;
- 4. Reduce undernutrition and break the intergenerational cycle of hunger.

- Enabling institutional and policy environments to support agricultural production and the full range of related nonfarm activities.

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
