About the Charity Commission

What is the Charity Commission?

The Charity Commission is the regulator of charities in England and Wales. Funded directly by the Treasury, we're an independent regulator, specifically exempt from Ministerial control and constituted as a non-ministerial government department. We're responsible for the registration of charities and for ensuring they understand and comply with charity law. As well as the 180,000 registered charities, which include large national and multinational charities and household names, we also regulate many thousands of small unregistered charities, such as those responsible for running village halls, parks and community projects.

What is this toolkit for?

When members of the public have concerns and complaints about a charity they often get in touch with their MP or AM. They may want to find out if their concerns are justified, inquire as to how to make a formal complaint, or ask their MP or AM to take up an issue on their behalf. This toolkit is designed to help you to deal with your constituents' queries and to let you know what to expect when you get in touch with us.

How can I check whether an organisation is a registered charity?

We can help you easily to identify whether or not an organisation is a registered charity. Using our website, www.charitycommission.gov.uk, you can search for a charity by name, its registration number, the area where it operates, or by keywords (such as 'community centre'). If the organisation you're interested in is a registered charity, then you can access information about it, such as its objectives, its trustees (including their contact details) and its financial history.

We vary the amount of information we ask for according to the size of the charity - so you'll find more detail about larger charities and less about smaller ones. This is because we want to make sure we don't impose a disproportionate burden on smaller charities. Similarly, it's important to note that some charities are not required to register with us, including those which have an annual income below £5,000.

How can the Charity Commission help me engage with my constituents?

From time to time, the Charity Commission launches campaigns to raise awareness of important charity issues, for example warning the public about bogus charity collectors. As an MP or AM, you can help us to publicise these issues in your local media, or by putting information on your website highlighting your concerns and offering advice to constituents. We sometimes send out example press releases as part of our campaign, which you can use to support your engagement with constituents.
