


Accommodation and Food Sector

Crime against the sector has fallen since 2012:


- The overall crime rate has fallen significantly, from 7,361 incidents per 1,000 premises to 4,677.
- Crime and victimisation rates for theft are down, driven by large significant falls in employee theft.
- Theft and vandalism were the most widespread crimes, each experienced by 13% of premises. 12% of premises experienced assaults and threats.

In 2014, the number of crimes per 1,000 premises was significantly higher for premises with more employees:



This pattern was also observed for most crime types.
