3.	Definition of Service	<p>The secure and safe operation of the establishment during the night state is effectively managed. The service provides adequate and safe levels of supervision to ensure that prisoners are safe and, where required, a secure perimeter is maintained at all times.</p> <p>The capability to move prisoners safely and securely around the establishment and to receive and/or discharge prisoners at night is in place.</p> <p>Prisoners' immediate needs will be met, as far as practicable, during the night and any anti-social behaviour will be managed effectively.</p>

Strategic Context	<p>The Night State is the most secure part of the prison day, with minimal internal movement of prisoners and no external entry except within exceptional circumstances where legal powers permit, or where the emergency services have been summoned.</p> <p>Neither the Prison Act 1952, nor Prison Rules, contains any specific references to nights or to working during the night state.</p> <p>Although an easier period in security management terms, the night state can be more demanding in certain circumstances which are often highlighted in local Independent Monitoring Board (IMB) annual reports, Prison and Probation Ombudsman (PPO) annual reports and investigations into deaths in custody, as well as audit reports, and inspection reports from Her Majesties Inspectorate of Prisons (HMIP). Recent examples include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The PPO Annual Report 2009-10 highlighted concerns regarding staff access to cells at night to facilitate emergency aid, and commended NOMS for issuing guidance on this practice. • The PPO Annual Report 2007-8 recommended night procedures which allow prisoners access to toilets and drinking water during night patrol states, where in-cell sanitation is not present. This followed a PPO investigation at an establishment where prisoners could not access such facilities during patrol state, and no staff resources were deployed to facilitate this. <p>The HMIP Expectations document, which HMIP uses to appraise and inspect prisons, includes a number of expectations regarding the safety, decency and security of prisoners. A general theme to emerge from HMIP establishment inspections has been the importance of ensuring the safe and secure location/treatment of prisoners new to custody during the night state, when staffing levels are significantly reduced. The main focus is to ensure the well being of prisoners, especially those who are considered vulnerable during this time. An emphasis is placed on ensuring that staff are adequately equipped and skilled to respond to incidents at night, without compromising the establishment's security. Like the PPO, HMIP is also keen to ensure that prisoner decency (such as access to sanitation facilities) is upheld.</p> <p>Other key policy documents include PSI 64/2011 Management of prisoners at risk of harm to self, to others and from others (Safer Custody). This underpins and supports the other fundamental outcome for this service, namely that prisoners are safe and feel safe during the night. Staff must be properly skilled in order</p>

		<p>to effectively monitor, observe and support prisoners.</p> <p>Above all other requirements, the night state must maintain security, decency and prisoner safety through local procedures and contingency plans.</p>
