Background

1.1 The Government has committed to give working parents of three- and four-year-olds 30 hours of free childcare a week. This will help hard-working families by reducing the cost of childcare and making it easier for parents who want to work, or work more hours, knowing that their children are well cared for. It will help the government deliver our aim to help working families to manage their finances.

1.2 To help deliver this extension, we have committed to increase the average rate paid to providers to the entitlement. It is essential that the rate we pay is fair for providers, value for money to the taxpayer, and consistent with the Government's fiscal plans.

1.3 That is why the government will carry out a review of the cost of providing childcare and why it has committed to increasing the average childcare funding rates paid to providers.

1.4 This call for evidence is part of a process of gathering the necessary evidence which will inform the review. The evidence will improve our understanding of what factors contribute to the cost of providing childcare for early years providers.

1.5 The findings from the call for evidence inform the review which will report in the autumn.

Scope of the call for evidence

2.1 The Department for Education welcomes any information you wish to provide to inform the review. In the next few months the department will undertake a review of the existing evidence on the cost of childcare in England. The evidence you provide will form part of this exercise. We particularly welcome any information you may be able to provide on the following:

- Existing studies and research about the cost of childcare, for example assessments carried out by local authorities on the cost of childcare locally.
- Evidence from early years providers about the factors that make up the cost of providing childcare, and how much of the total cost they represent.

2.2 The department may contact you in future as part of the review, either to discuss the evidence you have provided or to gather your views. Please indicate if you are not content for us to do this.
