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2015/16 Housing Benefit administration subsidy arrangements for Welsh local authorities

Introduction

- 1. This circular contains details of the **provisional** 2015/16 distribution of Housing Benefit (HB) administration subsidy, following consultation with representatives from the Local Authority Associations (LAAs). We are informing local authorities (LAs) of these provisional figures now to assist your financial planning, **but the figures are subject to any announcement in December's Autumn Statement which may affect the overall level of funding that is available.**
- Provision for the 2015/16 HB subsidy arrangements will be made by an Amendment Order to the Income-related (Subsidy to Authorities) Order 1998, which will also be subject to consultation with the LAAs prior to being laid before Parliament.

Background

- 3. Following the abolition of Council Tax Benefit (CTB) and the introduction of the Council Tax Reduction Scheme (CTRS) in April 2013, the funding baseline for HB/CTB has remained disaggregated. The Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) is responsible for allocating the HB element (80% of the total) to LAs with responsibility for distributing the remaining 20% CTRS element being with the Department for Communities and Local Government and the Devolved Administrations to distribute to their respective LAs.
- 4. The 2015/16 HB administration subsidy for Welsh LAs before deductions for the Single Fraud Investigation Service (SFIS) is provisionally £15.15 million and is based on 10% efficiency savings uprated for inflation.

Netting and Capping

- 5. Netting and capping is a method to dampen/limit the amount of change between funding from one year to the next, and thus provide some financial stability for authorities. The net is the lower limit, whilst the cap is the upper limit. Netting and capping is not new and has been applied in previous years.
- 6. Discussions between DWP officials and Welsh Local Government Association representatives about allocating 2015/16 HB funding concluded that netting and capping only be applied to the HB funding. It was agreed that the net and cap percentages applied to Welsh LAs would be 5.1% and 0% respectively.
- 7. Individual HB allocations are shown in Annex 1of this circular.

Distribution methodology

8. DWP will allocate each LA a share of the total HB administration subsidy that reflects its share of the national HB work done, with adjustments that reflect some

- differences in regional costs based upon Single Housing Benefit Extract caseload data for the period from June 2013 to May 2014.
- 9. We used latest available information on LA costs to update the weightings used to reflect the proportion of LA labour and accommodation costs.

Labour cost adjustments

- 10. For **labour costs**, we used the most up to date information on the Annual Survey of Hours and Earnings (ASHE) to derive the labour cost indices split between England, Scotland and Wales.
- 11. *Table 1* shows a summary of the regional values used for the 2015/16 distribution.

Accommodation factors

- 12. For **accommodation factors**, we used the information of the Property Market Report provided by the Valuation Office Agency (VOA). These represent a split of accommodation costs between England, Scotland and Wales.
- 13. *Table 2* shows a summary of the regional values used for the 2015/16 distribution.

The formula

- 14. The subsidy is distributed amongst LAs by taking HB caseloads into account, with different weightings to compensate for variations in accommodation and labour costs between regions.
- 15. The administration subsidy for a particular LA is equal to a fraction of the total administration subsidy. This fraction is calculated using the caseloads and the labour and accommodation indices which are scaled by the average which has been weighted by caseload.

Factor = caseload x [0.32 + 0.64 x scaled labour indices + 0.04 x scaled accommodation indices]

Administration subsidy = factor x total administration subsidy / sum of factors for all LAs

SFIS

16. LAs that are affected by staff being transferred to SFIS in 2014/15 have already been informed by letter on 21 October 2014 about the impact this will have upon their funding. The figures shown in Annex 1 are net of this reduction which has been applied after the netting and capping process.

Payments of subsidy

17. Payments of interim administration subsidy will be made in monthly instalments beginning in April 2015. The overall grant available to support HB administration costs is cash limited and so there is no provision for any adjustments to be made to individual LA allocations.
