Design Panel for Interchange Station

In April an important step was taken when the HS2 Design Panel was welcomed by Solihull Metropolitan Borough Council for a first meeting to discuss Interchange Station on site.

The Borough Council have selected 16 members of the main HS2 Design Panel to participate in future reviews of Interchange Station. This first meeting, chaired by Sadie Morgan, started with the Council taking panel members on a tour of the area around the station, giving them an insight into the local context and physical constraints. This was followed by a Panel meeting where the Council explained the planning context and emerging masterplan for a mixed use 'Garden City'.

HS2 and Arup presented their current work on a 'Design Ambitions' document for the station, which is being developed to establish a joint vision for the project. The Panel had an opportunity for comments on the strategic issues that had been raised.

This induction day will provide the basis for future Design Panel meetings, as the station design and masterplan are developed in more detail - with 5 or 6 panel members attending each meeting.
