TEST	KEY QUESTIONS
Necessary	Will it be appropriate to refuse planning permission without the requirements imposed by the condition?
	<ul> <li>A condition must not be imposed unless there is a definite planning reason for it, ie it is needed to make the development acceptable in planning terms.</li> </ul>
	If a condition is wider in scope than is necessary to achieve the desired objective it will fail the test of necessity.
Relevant to planning	Does the condition relate to planning objectives and is it within the scope of the permission to which it is to be attached?
	<ul> <li>A condition must not be used to control matters that are subject to specific control elsewhere in planning legislation (for example, advertisement control, listed building consents, or tree preservation).</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Specific controls outside planning legislation may provide an alternative means of managing certain matters (for example, works on public highways often require highways' consent).</li> </ul>
Relevant to the development to be permitted	Does the condition fairly and reasonably relate to the development to be permitted?
	It is not sufficient that a condition is related to planning objectives: it must also be justified by the nature or impact of the development permitted.
	<ul> <li>A condition cannot be imposed in order to remedy a pre-existing problem or issue not created by the proposed development.</li> </ul>

Enforceable	<ul> <li>Would it be practicably possible to enforce the condition?</li> <li>Unenforceable conditions include those for which it would, in practice, be impossible to detect a contravention or remedy any breach of the condition, or those concerned with matters over which the applicant has no control.</li> </ul>
Precise	Is the condition written in a way that makes it clear to the applicant and others what must be done to comply with it?  • Poorly worded conditions are those that do not clearly state what is required and when must not be used.
Reasonable in all other respects	<ul> <li>Is the condition reasonable?</li> <li>Conditions which place unjustifiable and disproportionate burdens on an applicant will fail the test of reasonableness.</li> <li>Unreasonable conditions cannot be used to make development that is unacceptable in planning terms acceptable.</li> </ul>
