



DFID has been operating in Iraq since 2014 to provide humanitarian assistance and protection to people affected by Daesh's capture of large areas of Iraq. The United Nations (UN) has declared Iraq a Level 3 humanitarian emergency, a category reserved for the most serious and complex crises. Millions of people in Iraq are displaced and in need of urgent humanitarian assistance. Minorities are under threat and the security situation has had a major impact on women and children's rights and wellbeing. DFID's goal, as part of the wider UK effort, is to help to meet the urgent needs of people affected by conflict, whilst supporting the Government of Iraq's efforts to stabilise the country.

## Outline of DFID Iraq Country Programme

Our primary objective is protecting civilians through an effective humanitarian response, led by the Government of Iraq.

DFID is the leading donor to the UN-led Iraq Humanitarian Pooled Fund (IHPF)<sup>1</sup> which responds to urgent needs of the most vulnerable people in Iraq. It supported 4.9 million people with life-saving healthcare, water, sanitation, and safe places to stay in 2016 and is now providing vital assistance to tens of thousands of people affected by military operations to remove Daesh. DFID has also funded partners responding to urgent water, sanitation, shelter and trauma needs in and around Mosul.

Through the UK Government's Conflict, Stability and Security Fund (CSSF), DFID is supporting the UN managed stabilisation activities. This programme focuses on the restoration of basic services such as health and electricity, and getting local governance back on its feet. UK support has contributed to helping more than 2.2 million people to return to their homes. The UK also provided support to the Iraqi authorities to respond to the crisis that has hit their country through a UNDP programme that helps to improve the effectiveness of Iraq's crisis response mechanisms.

In 2016 the UK provided a £300m loan guarantee, through the World Bank, to unlock additional finance to help Iraq cope with the impact of low oil prices and the consequences of the conflict with Daesh.

### Key results achieved (2014 - 2016)

- Food for more than **250,000 people**
- Over **325,000 people** have benefited from shelter kits, upgrades to camps and received essential household items
- Life-saving healthcare services, including primary healthcare, vaccinations and health education, to over **3.9 million people**
- More than **800,000 people** have been provided with safe water and sanitation
- Cash assistance to more than **110,000** highly vulnerable people
- Protection support to over **60,000 people** for gender-based violence, psycho-social support, child protection, mine risk awareness and mine disposal programming
