Annex A: Summary of projects already funded

The Fund has supported 126 projects, worth £50.6 million, that are tackling a range of issues identified locally, such as English language provision, rough sleeping or rogue and criminal landlords.

32 projects, worth £8.9 million, are being delivered by authorities caring for unaccompanied asylum seeking children (UASC).

Both are shown in this table. The table does not include payments distributed centrally to build capacity to care for UASC (see para 62 of the prospectus)

The funding will predominantly be to used recruit additional staff to improve the orientation of UASC, to ensure a consistency of approach in welcoming and supporting UASC to as they settle into the local community in Leeds, in various accommodation options appropriate to their needs.
Yorkshire and Humber	Leeds (Migration Yorkshire)	£396,930	Place-based data and mitigating local impacts of migration: This is a research project to better understand how and why migration impacts differently in different local communities in Yorkshire and Humber, and how local authorities plan for and deal with these impacts. The project will identify different types of neighbourhoods using a range of socio-economic and migration data, and then explore how a selection of these neighbourhoods respond to migration, through hearing the views of a cross-section of local residents and service providers. The project will improve how local authorities prepare for and address issues related to new migration. It will also inform the nationwide understanding of the impact of recent migration.

Yorkshire and Humber	North Lincolnshire	£328,079	Safer, Greener, Cleaner: Responding to concerns, this proposal focuses on a specific area within the Town and Crosby and Park wards of Scunthorpe and is in response to concerns around anti-social behaviour, fly tipping and rogue landlords. The money will be used to help build a more resilient and strong community with a shared understanding of local cultural and civic expectations. It will also be used to improve access to key services.
Yorkshire and Humber	North East Lincolnshire	£232,500	Rogue Landlord Project: The multi-agency project will aim to improve the quality and quantity of localised data to help identify rogue landlord activity, addressing the vulnerability, social tensions, service pressures and crime that can result. The project will initially focus on the wards which the LA believes are most affected by rogue landlord activity: Immingham, parts of Park Ward, East Marsh and West Marsh; and restaurant and takeaway premises across the local authority area.
Yorkshire and Humber	North Yorkshire	£61,000	Growing on the inside by being outside: The successful bid for North Yorkshire covers both North Yorkshire City Council and York City. These areas have little experience in taking on Unaccompanied Asylum Seeker Children but want to establish greater capacity to take up to 40 children through the National Transfer Scheme. The bid also recognises the need to integrate activities with local residents to promote cohesion and build skills for UASC to be independent members of their communities.
Yorkshire and Humber	Rotherham	£1,307,289	Building Stronger Communities: Rotherham has an overarching strategy around Building Stronger Communities that emphasises that Rotherham is a shared community focusing on ensuring effective delivery and efficient use of public services. Providing English language support to help new migrant communities navigate services more efficiently and enable them to engage more effectively with the resident communities. Tackling exploitative practices such as modern slavery, addressing environmental health issues such as fly tipping, combatting anti social behaviour and criminal behaviour in public places and tackling disruptive behaviour in schools.
Yorkshire and Humber	Sheffield	£835,000	Sheffield Community Investment Deal: Community based project located in marginalised communities in North-East and East Sheffield, responding to concerns from local people with more on the ground officers, better organised local services and engaging established and new communities through community development initiatives to improve their areas.
Yorkshire and Humber	Wakefield	£393,834	Community Harmony – Wakefield: The resident community have reported concerns around worsening street scene, increasing intolerance, hate crime and overcrowded housing. This programme centres on central Wakefield. This project will challenge problem landlords, ensure more migrants can speak English and improve relations between young communities through youth work and volunteering to make the streets presentable reducing community tensions and creating an inclusive and supportive community feeling in the target area.
Yorkshire and Humber	York	£561,041	Developing Regional Fostering Capacity and Expertise for Supporting UASC: The Yorkshire & Humber region, working collaboratively across all Local Authorities, will provide Unaccompanied Asylum Seeking Children with appropriate and welcoming placements. The funding will be used to recruit, train and support foster carers and supported lodgings providers throughout the region. Social workers, support workers and others will benefit from increased training, information and support, to ensure unaccompanied children achieve the best possible outcomes.

Modern Slavery

The Fund has committed £1.1m to trial new ways of supporting victims of Modern Slavery in six local authorities, as they transition away from government support and integrate into their communities

London	Redbridge	£175,000	Support to ensure that a robust care plan is in place for victims leaving the National Referral Mechanism. The funding will also ensure victims have safe accommodation and fund technology to help victims feel safe in their homes.
West Midlands	Birmingham	£175,000	Funding to create a 'one-stop' provision catering for all the potential needs of victims transitioning out of National Referral Mechanism (NRM) support.
