

# Local authority commissioned special free schools

An expression of interest form for local authorities interested in commissioning a special free school

October 2016

## **Overview**

Since local authorities play a key role in placing pupils with statements or Education, Health and Care (EHC) plans, it is important that they shape the range of provision in their area. Previously, proposals to establish special free schools have only been taken forward in consultation with local authorities. We are now providing a further opportunity for local authorities themselves to identify where a new special free school would benefit their area, inform their Regional Schools Commissioner (RSC), and potentially seek proposals for the new school they want, with the Department for Education (DfE) providing capital funding and start-up grants. This is in addition to the central route for special free schools, which continues to operate.

This expression of interest (EOI) form is for local authorities that would like a new special school. It allows them to make a case that a special school would be beneficial in their area, including a case that it would help meet demographic growth, changing patterns of need, and cost pressures, without reducing inclusion. It provides RSCs with the initial information they need to understand what is wanted and why. If the EOI is successful, the opportunity will be advertised nationally, and if a strong proposal comes forward that both the local authority/authorities and the Secretary of State wish to take forward, the DfE will provide capital and start-up grant funding, subject to value for money assessments covering both the affordability of the site solution and the limitations on overall capital availability. Please see the accompanying guidance for further detail.

The form should be completed by a local authority representative (or representatives, if it is a joint bid) with the approval of the Director of Children's Services (DCS).

This opportunity is intended to identify and meet untapped demand for special free schools as a supplement to LA's existing resources. It does not replace the 'presumption' process nor does it replace a local authority's duties to ensure appropriate placements for all children with Special Educational Needs (SEN).

Existing special schools in Hampshire have a good reputation for the quality of educational provision they make for the pupils with the most severe long term and complex special educational needs. The local authority has carefully considered the viability of expanding these existing special schools, but it has become apparent through analysis of data that the changing profile of the special school population indicates a different approach to benefit all special needs pupils is now needed. Detailed analysis of current availability of special school places for the children and young people of Hampshire shows that three new special schools will greatly benefit children accessing special places across the area.

In tandem with our own special provision, we have built effective working relationships with special schools in the independent and non maintained sector and it is our intention to further strengthen this relationship through stronger and more robust procurement routes with these providers. This will enable the local authority to maintain its access to a wide range of bespoke and highly individualised educational options for Hampshire children who require the most specialised level of provision.

To complement the current available provision, it would benefit the families of Hampshire if we were able to provide specialist provision with a different primary focus than our existing special schools. To that end we would propose that one new school is built to meet the needs of the growing number of children who are presenting with social communication needs (SCN), often but not exclusively linked to autistic spectrum disorders or conditions. Analysis of requests for Education, Health and Care (EHC) assessments in the last two years shows a 60% increase in the number of requests where autistic spectrum disorder is cited as the primary need. This is often manifested by severe anxiety and social isolation.

The provision of a special school for children aged 4-16 exhibiting social communication difficulties would enable these vulnerable children to be able to access education in a safe and familiar environment thus alleviating levels of anxiety and enabling learning to take place. By providing an

'all through' special school, the heightened levels of anxiety caused by transition at the end of key stage 2 would be obviated for these vulnerable pupils. Currently children with this type of special educational need are attending special schools for children with learning difficulties, or mainstream schools, neither of which are ideally suited to the particular needs of this cohort of children. This will help reduce the number of children with SEN we are currently placing in independent and non-maintained schools, and also reduce the number of pupils who are currently placed, sometimes inappropriately, in mainstream schools who can find it a challenge to properly meet the children's special educational needs. Projected figures reflecting proposed housing developments and population growth indicate that the pressure on having sufficient specialist spaces available in Hampshire for these children will continue to increase.

District and Ward level forecasting of primary and secondary phase pupils with SCN/ASD has highlighted an area of growth in Hampshire, operating alongside an insufficient level of provision for

this particular type of need. Hampshire has no special schools of this type. Pupils who require a special school place attend other special schools in the county which are not meeting their primary need, and all of which are under considerable pressure. All 24 county wide places are provided in 2 secondary resourced provisions. Forecasts show a combined shortfall of 448 places in 1516 which is forecast to increase to 474 by 2021. A new all through SCN/ASD provision with 50 primary and 75 secondary places will help accommodate a large proportion of the growth over the next 5 years. The county council would envisage new provision being delivered by 2020/2021.

The free special school would be financially sustainable as it is required based on forecast pupil number growth. In terms of delivering value for money, it would obviously increase the overall capacity of SEN places in Hampshire, which may result in a reduced need to send pupils to out of county independent or non-maintained special schools – which usually comes at a much higher cost. It will also reduce transport costs by providing local places for existing pupils which are currently travelling large distances to attend a suitable specialist provision.

One of the priorities for Hampshire's SEND strategy is to 'Strengthen Inclusion in Mainstream Settings'. The new special school would not be a mechanism to decrease inclusion in our mainstream schools. We are committed to ensuring that whenever possible and appropriate Hampshire children are enabled to attend their local school in their local community. The new school would help ease the current and projected future pressure on special school places, as highlighted in the data above. In common with our existing special schools there would be an expectation that the new school would offer outreach support to mainstream schools in order to develop the mainstream schools' skills and widen their repertoire of interventions to ensure pupils can remain in a mainstream setting wherever possible. There would also be a focus on re-integration, so that there would be a clear articulated outcome for pupils being placed in the special school that they would be transferred into their local mainstream school as soon as this was viable, with careful and co-ordinated transition planning between the schools and the families concerned.

Hampshire is forecast to grow by 57,500 homes since the 2011 census, with corresponding growth in the same period in pupil numbers of 15,900 for the 0-10 age range. Primary aged child numbers in the underlying population began to grow in 2008, and are predicted to continue.

The Wave Free school application was made in September 2016. In our view this has been poorly constructed and is not supported at this stage. From the information we have the local authority does not consider that proposals are sufficiently coherent, well developed or costed to incorporate them into the local authority strategy. However, we are open to further discussions with the proposers that might offer a better fit within our overall SEN strategy.
