

Local authority commissioned special free schools

An expression of interest form for local authorities interested in commissioning a special free school

October 2016

Overview

Since local authorities play a key role in placing pupils with statements or Education, Health and Care (EHC) plans, it is important that they shape the range of provision in their area. Previously, proposals to establish special free schools have only been taken forward in consultation with local authorities. We are now providing a further opportunity for local authorities themselves to identify where a new special free school would benefit their area, inform their Regional Schools Commissioner (RSC), and potentially seek proposals for the new school they want, with the Department for Education (DfE) providing capital funding and start-up grants. This is in addition to the central route for special free schools, which continues to operate.

This expression of interest (EOI) form is for local authorities that would like a new special school. It allows them to make a case that a special school would be beneficial in their area, including a case that it would help meet demographic growth, changing patterns of need, and cost pressures, without reducing inclusion. It provides RSCs with the initial information they need to understand what is wanted and why. If the EOI is successful, the opportunity will be advertised nationally, and if a strong proposal comes forward that both the local authority/authorities and the Secretary of State wish to take forward, the DfE will provide capital and start-up grant funding, subject to value for money assessments covering both the affordability of the site solution and the limitations on overall capital availability. The form should be completed by a local authority representative (or representatives, if it is a joint bid) with the approval of the Director of Children's Services (DCS).

This opportunity is intended to identify and meet untapped demand for special free schools as a supplement to LA's existing resources. It does not replace the 'presumption' process nor does it replace a local authority's duties to ensure appropriate placements for all children with Special Educational Needs (SEN).

You should use this form to provide all the necessary information and evidence for your proposal. Please:

- Within SLD and PMLD this will cater for students with a diagnosis of ASD.
- The school will be providing out-reach support with a number of settings.
- Expertise will be share between the other 4 special schools in the LA this will be a centre
 of excellence with South Gloucestershire. There will also be opportunities under the
 'inclusion model' to work with the Local Secondary Academy Trust which will share the
 site.
- Within the nursery model the expectation will be a 30 hours a week provision term time only i.e. 38 weeks/year.
- Additionally, with the Post 16 provision there will be an opportunity to develop shared courses across the authority and to work alongside both the maintained Post 16 Sector i.e. SGS and Independent Sector.

Section C - Rationale for School

Please provide an explanation of how and why this provision is required and how it would benefit the local area. [500 words max.]

- How the school will fit into the broader spectrum of SEN provision in the region (including neighbouring LAs if appropriate). In August 2014 the Strategic Review of SEN identified a major challenge facing South Gloucestershire LA to provide places for pupils with profound and multiple learning difficulties (PMLD) and severe learning difficulties (SLD) over the next ten years. Post-16 was also identified as a priority area needing additional provision, as the current trend to meet this need is to place within the Independent Sector. In November 2015 the Lead Members agreed that one of the main priorities was so ensure sufficient and effective provision for children and young people with SEN and Disability. The High Needs Block of the DSG is currently experiencing significant budget pressures which are anticipated to continue for the foreseeable future. The Council is working with the Schools Forum and all Schools to develop a strategic plan to deliver cost efficiencies in the provision of SEND support and places. On average placing a pupil with SLD/PMLD needs costs in the order of more per pupil, per annum when placing in private or independent specialist provision compared to placing the pupil in maintained/academy provision. Developing more in-authority provision is therefore a critical element of that strategy and the proposal for a new school set out in this Expression of Interest now forms a critical element of that strategy.
- How it would help meet pressures on special educational provision. It has been recognised that the young people with PMLD and SLD exceeds the current number of available places. The Local Authority has responded to the need by expanding current special school provision i.e. New Siblands and Warmley Park, however land and accommodation constraints limit any further expansion of these schools. The proposed Free School will provide provision for a nursery class which will allow more specialist interventions and a centre of excellence where shared expertise can be disseminated through other schools/provision across the region. The school would provide cost savings and health benefits for young people due to the reduced need to be transported into other local authorities' provisions.
- The potential impact on inclusion, including (where applicable) types of expert support you would expect the school to provide to mainstream schools in the area. The school would be situated on a site where there is currently a Secondary Mainstream School. The location of the school will allow a two way avenue for Inclusion, encouraging social integration with the mainstream secondary school and vice versa. Opportunities for shared work will be developed. The school will be a centre for excellence and will provide training, guidance and support to mainstream schools.
- **Parental demand:** Parental demand for more specialist provision is articulated in the responses to a survey of parents concerning new school provision for children with SLD. Parents were asked:

Do you feel there is a need for a new school for children and young people with SLD in south Gloucestershire?

Are you happy to support the LA putting forward an expression of interest for a new school?

The responses to a survey to parents are summarised in the attached.

The Parent/Carer Forum support this bid and in a letter of support the CEO has commented: 'It is vital that we find more provision for our Children who need this support and our current schools are full. Parents have told us that this is impacting on the class sizes of our other specialist schools and that parents are worried where their children would go if no places are available.' Letter attached.

The purpose of this section is to help us to understand the need for a new school in the context of how existing provision is used, and future expected growth in need. We want to approve EOIs that:

- address demographic growth
- · help LAs meet what pupils and parents want
- help LAs manage within their budgetary constraints

We do not want to approve EOIs that have the side-effect of decreasing inclusion in mainstream schools, or of creating excess spare capacity in existing special schools. (eg. if several LAs each want a similar school, any one of those might make sense on its own but in aggregate there might not be enough need.) D1: Pupils who would go to the new special school

The Council's bid for a new free school addresses demographic growth experienced as a result of natural population change, net international migration and consequent major new house building. South Gloucestershire has experienced a steep rise in population in the last 30 years and is recognised as one of the fastest growing economic areas in the country. The Council's pupil number projections indicate year on year growth in numbers. The numbers of children with a statement/plan are consistent with this trend and indicate basic need growth of approximately 700 statemented/plan children over the short to medium term. The scale of growth brings a need for more housing and pressure on services and infrastructure. The Council is managing growth of 20,000 new homes over the next 12 years and this is estimated to generate an additional 15,500 children aged 0. Of these, approximately 570 children will require an EHC Plan and approximately half of these will require a specialist placement. The current pattern of provision indicates half of all children with a statement of SEN/ECH Plan attend mainstream provision. Approximately one quarter of all children with a statement of SEN attend a place at a special school and just under one third of these will be children with Severe Learning Difficulties and Profound and Multiple Learning Difficulties. The pupil projections take this pattern of demand into account and assume that mainstream schools will continue to provide a high proportion of children with a statement/plan with access to inclusive education.

The Council has a good proven-track record of delivering new SEND places over recent years through expanding existing provision and developing new provision. The proposed new school has similarly been planned to ensure financial viability. A key aspect of financial viability is ensuring demand for new places is known with a high degree of certainty. The related pupil number projections clearly demonstrate this and the reality is even starker when looked at in detail. Currently the SEND Service has 22 nursery age pupils with SLD/PMLD needs to place in September 2017 with identified provision for only 8 of those pupils. The ability to place the remaining 14 pupils is severely limited at this stage as there is no capacity within the Authority and no identifiable provision even within the private or independent sector within reasonable or allowed travel distances. Even if those places were identifiable within the private or independent sector then the annual additional cost compared to being able to place within authority to the High Needs Block of more costly support measures will need to made, for example within existing resource bases to allow them to provide the support needed for these pupils. This is likely to add even greater pressures to the High Needs Block. In a similar vein the cost savings likely to accrue from shorter travel distances for the new School are likely to be in the region of per pupil, resulting in an annual saving of up to the High Needs Block of the DSG once the School is at full capacity.

Please provide a brief explanation of any recent trends and the rationale for future projections [200 words max.]

The projections for children with a statement/EHC Plan are based on the existing pupil numbers on roll for all mainstream schools/provision in South Gloucestershire. The projections are split by age range and mirror the growing trend of increasing numbers of children aged 0-19 over the next 10 years. Numbers across the age range are rolled forward using existing patterns of need recorded in the Council's Capita and SEN2 data sources and are based on current/growing incidence rates which vary across the age range. The principle input to the projections is the Council's *pipeline* data. This data is obtained from close partnership working with healthcare professionals to identify children with severe/complex needs at a very early stage in order to plan appropriate place provision (a pathway) for children as young as 2 years old. The data provides short to medium term projections (these are referred to as basic need) and a separate analysis of the impact of major new house building is undertaken to ensure that the needs of new and developing communities in South Gloucestershire are fully considered in line with current patterns of demand for specialist provision.

The basic need pupil projections indicate an increase of 700 children with statements of SEN/EHC Plan by 2026. The yield of children with a statement of SEN/EHC Plan arising from new housing will generate approximately 570 children. This is a total of 1270 children. Half of these will require a specialist place. Just under 400 children will attend a special school and approximately 29% will have Severe Learning Difficulties. This equates to approximately 105 pupils. Additionally, it is projected that 5-10 children with a primary ASD need will have a secondary SLD need. These will be placed in a school for children with SLD. It is also sensible to provide additional places for children with PMLD. Currently, the Council places 15% of all children with PMLD to out of area specialist placements. The projections indicate a further 5 children will require places in South Gloucestershire within this plan period. These combined figures indicate the need for a new 112 place special school providing for children with SLD/PMLD.
