Our modern Industrial Strategy sets out our long-term plan to boost productivity by backing business to create high quality, well-paid jobs throughout the United Kingdom with investment in skills, industries and infrastructure.

In D2N2, as it is known, a partnership of business and civic leaders – alongside other local partners – is working with the government to build on existing strengths, help business to flourish, and grow skills and opportunities for workers across the area.

Industrial Strategy highlights include:

 **£600,000** to the University of Nottingham to develop molecule drug substances that can help create new and more targeted pharmaceutical treatments.

 **£18m** for improvements to the A614 at Ollerton to support the economic potential of North Nottinghamshire by improving access to key tourism sites such as Sherwood Forest Country Park.

 **£3m** to accelerate housebuilding by providing the vital infrastructure needed to access new and existing sites.

 **1,046,700** people in employment, an increase of **71,500** since 2010. **62,900** workers directly benefiting from the National Living and Minimum Wages. **20,290** apprenticeships starts last year.

Case study: The Sustainable Energy Futures Building

The Sustainable Energy Futures Building, which consists of cutting-edge laboratories and equipment at the Jubilee Campus in the University of Nottingham, has received an investment of £12m. The facility is helping the UK to advance its position as a global leader in the energy sector and the Industrial Strategy's "mission" to halve the energy use of new buildings by 2030, part of the Clean Growth Grand Challenge. It supports the government's targets to reduce carbon emissions by testing and developing new low-carbon technologies.
