

Travelling with Children - Cyprus

Travelling with children abroad

The <u>UK Border force</u> has advice for those travelling to the UK with children & additional advice is available at '<u>Get Permission to take a child abroad</u>'. Other countries' immigration rules, however, may require parents or those travelling with children to carry documentary evidence to prove their relationship with the child or permission from parents or quardians to take the child out of the country.

Things to consider when travelling with children in and out of Cyprus

Parents are advised to seek the consent of the other parent before leaving the country. Although there is no law that prevents one parent taking the child out of the country, either parent can place their child/children on a 'Stop File', via the Cypriot Immigration authorities, to prevent them leaving the country.

A parent, who decides to leave Cyprus with his or her children without first seeking the approval of the other parent, or in breach of a custody court order, could be subject to criminal prosecution and may find themselves charged with abduction.

Custody law in Cyprus

Under Cypriot law, similar to that of the UK, parents have equal parental responsibility over their children. Therefore, in the absence of a court order, parents have equal rights and responsibilities over the care of a child. If parents cannot agree how to share parental authority, either parent may ask the court to decide.

Cyprus (excluding the northern part of Cyprus) and the United Kingdom are both signatories to the <u>1980 Hague</u> Convention on the Civil Aspects of International Child <u>Abduction</u>. This is an international agreement which primarily aims to ensure the return of an abducted child to the country where he or she normally lives (Habitual Residence), so that issues of residency (custody) and contact (access) may be resolved. This Convention aims to protect the rights of parents and children by preventing one parent from taking a child from its country of residence without the knowledge or consent of the other.

Applying for a British Passport for children

The British High Commission no longer issues full validity passports. For information on how to apply for a British passport while in Cyprus please <u>visit</u>.

Emergency Travel Documents

Should your passport be lost, stolen or have recently expired and you need to travel urgently, the British High Commission can issue an <u>Emergency Travel Document</u> for travel to specified countries. Please contact the High Commission on (+357) 22861100 to discuss your options with a Consular Officer. If you apply for a child under 16, they'll need to attend an appointment. Both parents should go with them if possible. If one parent (or any other person with Parental Responsibility) cannot attend the ETD appointment, they'll need to sign a <u>consent letter</u>. **Children requesting Emergency Travel Documents will require the written authorisation of both parents**.
