





5.0
Check to see what **tariffs** your EU customer will need to pay, or if there are any tariff-free quotas

6.0
Complete an export customs declaration **via your export agent** or **do it yourself**

7.0
Your EU importer also needs to complete an import customs declaration on the EU Customs platform and they need to ensure that they have an EU EORI number

8.0
If your product requires it, you should now send a copy of certificate of conformity to national clearance hub

9.0
Send goods to the EU along with relevant documentation

10.0
Goods arrive at EU border
Uncontrolled fruit and veg do not require phytosanitary checks at the border. Controlled fruit and veg may undergo physical, document and identity checks at the border. This may include laboratory testing

11.0
Check if EU member state also requires an EU marketing standards certificate by contacting the EU member state's competent authority

11.1
Each member state has their own system for marketing standards certificates so the exact process will vary
This process can only take place after the goods have left the UK. This is either done automatically if risk is considered low or after an inspection if required

11.1
Customs clear goods

12.0
Good arrive at destination
Routine surveillance may be carried out by EU member state competent authority
