In reply to your letter of 17th October about the difficulties over discharges into Whittle Hill Quarry experienced during recent months by the Springfields Establishment of the Authority's Industrial Group it is agreed that in view of the short fall during the preceding two months we should not raise any objections to the discharge during October of an additional 145 tons of solid waste in addition to the 250 tons covered by the present authorisation.

I gather from the Ministry of Housing and Local Government that you now wish to proceed with your request for a revised authorisation on the lines mentioned in Carnochan's letter to Williams dated 3rd September last and I should be glad if you would let me have a copy of your letter to Wickenden on this subject. I should like to suggest, however, that it would be better to base the revised authorisation on a period of thirteen weeks rather than three consecutive calendar months.

You wrote to me on 17th October explaining that, owing to transport difficulties, the discharges of solid radioactive waste into Whittle Hill Quarry during August and September only amounted to 355 tons and you sought permission to dispose of 395 tons into the quarry in October, ASS.

We have of course already agreed in principle that these discharges could be based on a three-monthly control period and the effect of this proposal would be that in the three months August, September and October the total discharge would not exceed the aggregate of the amounts already authorised.

In the circumstances we agree that the Authority may discharge into the quarry during the month of October a further 145 tons of solid wastes of the type described in the authorisation of 24th March, 1958, in addition to the amount already permitted under that authorisation. This letter may be taken as an authorisation for the purposes of Section 5(4) of the Atomic Energy Authority Act, 1954.

Dear Wickenden,

You will remember that on 2nd September you wrote to Williams about our suggestion to amend the authorisation for discharges of solid waste into the Whittle Hill Quarry to enable discharges to be regulated over a three monthly rather than a monthly period. You suggested that there should be a single amended authorisation, such suiting the relevant terms for the limiting of quantities and periods for those already exisiting in Section 1 (c) of the authorisation dated 24th March, 1958. I promised to take the matter up with our Industrial Group and in fact did so, but unfortunately there was a clerical slip-up and I do not seem to have taken any action on the reply we had from Hampton of our Industrial branch. This reply agreed entirely with your sug estions for the amendment of the authorisation. I should therefore be grateful if we could get this amendment made as soon as possible.

You dia mention in the last paragraph of your letter an informal approach which you thought had been made for the disposal into the quarry of certain wastes not covered by the authorisation. Our Industrial Group does not think that we need pursue this further.

The Springfields Establishment of the Authority's Industrial Group owing to transport difficulties were only able to dispose of 159 tons of waste into Whittle Hill Quarry in August and only 196 tons in September although the current authorisation permits of disposal of up to 250 tons per month.

I am now writing on their behalf to ask whether you would issue the Authority with written permission to dispose of 395 tons of waste from Springfields into the Whittle Hill Quarry during October 1958. The figure of 395 tons is made up of the 250 tons already authorised for October plus the short fall for August and September which amounts to 145 tons. Section 1 (a)(i) of the authorisation refers to process residues which have received chemical treatment for recovery of uranium and which are estimated to contain not more than 0.25% of natural uranium by weight of such quantity of uranium of higher specific activity as produces an equivalent amount of activity. I understand from our Industrial Group that disposals of this type of waste will be confined to not more than ten tons for each of the three months August, September and October. The total discharge for the months of October to December, inclusive, will not exceed 750 tons.

If you are in agreement with this arrangement I should be glad to have an ad hoc authorisation as soon as possible.

I am sending a copy of this letter to Dow of the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food and should be grateful if he would take similar action on behalf of his Ministry.

PLEASE ASK MINISTRIES CONCERNED FOR WRITTEN AUTHORITY TO DISPOSE OF 395 TONS IN OCTOBER. THIS FIGURE IS THE TOTAL OF 250 TONS FOR OCTOBER PLUS THE CARRY FORWARD OF 145 TONS FROM AUGUST AND SEPTEMBER. In your letter of 26th June you asked whether the authorisation for the discharge of solid radioactive wastes from Springfields and Capenhurst into the Whittle Hill Quarry could be amended to cover three monthly, rather than monthly, periods. We have considered this request within the Department and agree in principle to averaging the monthly releases over periods of three months on the understanding that the average monthly rate does not exceed the quantities given in the current authorisation.

You wrote to me on 19th June about the disposal of radioactive waste in the Whittle Hill Quarry and suggested the terms of the draft for us to send to the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food. In this draft you suggested that the authorisation could be re-drafted to cover three-monthly instead of monthly periods. We passed on this request to the Ministry and have now had a reply from Wickenden of the Ministry of Housing and Local Government to Williams.

The Ministry are apparently prepared to take a more favourable view of an immediate amendment in this case than they were in the case of the Windscale liquid disposal. I enclose a copy of Wickenden's letter which I think is selfexplanatory. If you are prepared to agree to the suggestion set out in the second paragraph of that letter please let me know and I will reply to Wickenden accordingly and ask him to arrange an alteration of the present authorisation. Would you also please at the same time confirm that there is no intention to increase the amount of waste to be disposed of in the quarry?

Thank you for sending me a copy of your letter of 26th June to Carnochan about the discharge of solid radioactive waste into Whittle Hill Quarry. I note that you have taken steps to ensure that the importance of not exceeding the terms of the authorisation is fully understood.

On technical grounds there would be no objection to an amendment to regulate the discharges over a three-monthly rather than a monthly period. There are of course general arguments against the frequent revision of authorisations which I mentioned in my letter of 1st August on the Windscale authorisation. I do not think they would apply with quite the same force here, provided you were content with a single amending authorisation substituting 'thirty tons', 'any three consecutive calendar months", and '750 tons', or something on those lines, for the limiting quantities and periods stipulated in 1(c) of the authorisation dated 24th March, 1958. In that event we would not feel obliged to consult any local interest beforehand on the amendment because the adjustment would be a very minor one compared with what we have been discussing for

/Windscale.

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Windscale. I understand that the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food have no objection; if you would like us to proceed on these lines please let me know.

I should mention that shortly after the current authorisation was issued an informal approach was made by Springfields to our technical people to find out whether they might discharge to the quarry certain wastes which, from the information given, appeared not to be covered by the authorisation. As you will appreciate we could not feel so happy about an amendment to cover additional wastes at this stage, but it may be that this point is no longer being pursued.

On lat August 1954 your Ministry issued two authorisations for the disposal of redisactive waste into Whittle Hill Quarry near Preston. One authorisation was for the disposal of waste from the Authority's establishment at Capenhurst and the other was for disposal of waste from the Authority's establishment at Springfields. The third paragraph of each authorisation reads as follows:-

"3. This authorisation may be varied by the Minister at any time after reasonable notice to the Authority."

We have now heard from the Headquarters of Industrial Group at Risley that there are certain differences in the two authorisations which render the working of them difficult in practice. The Capenhurst authorisation permits the disposal of material estimated to contain not more than 0.1% of uranium by weight, whereas the figure for Springfields is given as not more than 0.25% of uranium by weight. The quantity of waste to be discharged is not to exceed 10 tons a month in the case of Capenhurst and 100 tons a month in the case of Springfields. It is clear that the authorisations refer to contamination with natural uranium.

In view of this and other ancesalies in the authorizations, the matter has been carefully investigated at Risley and a report considered by the Works General Management Committee. The Committee have asked me to approach you with a view to obtaining the Minister's approval to the following alterations in the authorizations:-

- (i) There should be one single authorisation covering disposals at Whitle Hill Quarry from both Springfields and Capenhurst.
- (11) This authorization should permit the disposal of solid waste estimated to contain not more than 0.25% of natural uranium by weight or an equivalent amount of activity from uranium of higher specific activity.
- (iii) No limit should be placed on the weight of waste disposal since this has little or no bearing on any health issues which have to be considered.

If, however, there is some other reason why the authorising Ministers decide to impose a limit on the rate of discharge into the quarry, then the Authority would seek approval for a figure of 250 tons/month. This is likely to be adequate until 1960.

In making arrangements for the disposal of our normal factory waste, it has always been our policy to consult the local authority at a very early stage and to obtain their formal agreement.

This procedure was followed in the case of the Whittle Hill Quarry with the local authority, the "Chorley Rural District Council". We had discussions with their surveyor resulting in the following proposal:-

That we should dump in the quarry raising the level to within 10 to 15 feet of road level and then fill in with surrounding over burden, and that during this time we would enclose the area with an unclimbable fence. The material to be dumped would be "non-combustible construction material, broken graphite equipment, fluospar arising from process slags and ashes, other solid scrap containing no soluble chemicals liable to cause any damage. None of the materials present

C. J. Highton, Esq., U.K.A.E.A., St. Giles Court, LONDON, W.C.2. significant abnormal features nor undergoes any decomposition which would cause a subsidence. The fluosparis insoluble in water".

The Clerk to the Council wrote to us on 22nd October 1952, accepting the proposals.

This waste is far less dangerous than wastes from the average chemical manufacturer and it contains insignificant amounts of radio-activity. As far as possible we have tried to a void the association with radio-active waste as this could be misleading and confusing but in our own interests we have chosen our sites to meet the following conditions:-

- (1). It should be isolated and not part of a development area.
- (2) The drainage from the site should not connect with any water supplies in the locality which might be used as drinking water, for industrial purposes or inagriculture.

As in other cases we have consulted the Geological Survey Branch and in the use of Whittle Quarry, they have stated that there is no likelihood of filtration into any local water supply.

We have already dumped 2,000 tons into the quarry and we have regularly taken samples of free standing water in the quarry and samples from a nearby stream. The quarry water contains less radioactivity than the level which is internationally accepted as satisfactory for drinking over a lifespan of 70 years and the stream contains no activity.
