Your data is being collected by

The Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (Defra) is the data controller for the personal data you give APHA.

APHA also works with Scottish Government and the Welsh Government and we are joint controllers for any relevant personal data.

The Defra Data Protection Officer is responsible for monitoring that APHA is meeting the requirements of Data Protection legislation and contact details are in APHA's Personal Information Charter.

What your data is being collected and used for and the legal basis for processing

- Personal data is collected and stored to support APHA's function to identify and control endemic diseases in animals.
- Body Worn Video may be used when necessary for the safeguarding of APHA customers and employees.

These data are used to identify when and what type of different statutory testing is needed to control endemic disease. It also allows compensation to be paid where appropriate. The data are also used to understand the status of these diseases at local and national levels in order to better understand and control endemic diseases.

This also enables APHA to continuously improve in the design, development and delivery of TB policies.

Where required to by law, data may be published on UK Government or EU websites. Data may also be used for research purposes when compliant with GDPR.

Legal bases for processing include:

- The performance of a task carried out in the public interest or in the exercise of official authority vested in the controller
- For compliance to a legal obligation on the controller

Who your data may be shared with

Personal data may be made available to local authorities and other public bodies in the UK and EU to meet legal requirements.

We may share data with Defra and its agencies, Welsh Government, Scottish Government, Food Standards Agency, Public Health, and other organisations and enforcement authorities.

We may have to release information (including personal data and commercial information) under the following legislation:

- General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR)
- UK Data Protection Act 2018
- Freedom of Information Act 2000
- Environmental Information Regulations 2004

We will not allow any unwarranted breach of confidentiality and we will not act in contravention of our obligations under UK data protection legislation.

How long we will keep your data for

All information within APHA is held in accordance with our retention policy, if you would like more information please contact enquiries@apha.gsi.gov.uk

In specific circumstances information may be held for longer periods. Examples include:

- appeal
- audit activity
- complaint
- irregularity
- legal action
- a formal request for information

- individual decision making, in other words making a decision solely by automated means without any human involvement
- or profiling, in other words automated processing of personal data to evaluate certain things about an individual How we use particularly sensitive personal information

The transfer of data outside the European Economic Area (EEA)

The data you provide will largely not be transferred outside of the EEA. On rare occasions, when it is lawful and complementary to our work carried out in the public interest, research data may be transferred securely outside of the EEA.
