


Football-related arrests and banning order statistics, England & Wales, 2019/20 season





Season-on-season comparisons will in part reflect the restrictions in place during the COVID-19 pandemic.

- During the 2019/20 football season, all regulated football matches were suspended for 3 months due to public health concerns, following the COVID-19 outbreak.
- When football resumed, matches were played behind closed doors from mid-June to the end of the season in August.

319 fixtures were cancelled as a result of the COVID-19 outbreak

There were 2,663 regulated football matches in the 2019/20 season, of which 227 were played behind closed doors

Football-related arrests

55% (594) inside stadium

45% (495) outside stadium

In addition, there were 114 arrests by British Transport Police and 204 'other' (non-Schedule 1) arrests at football matches.

Football banning orders

1,621 football banning orders in force as at 1 August 2020

Of which, 22% (360) issued in 2019/20



Almost all football banning orders were issued to males (1,612; 99.4%).

18-34s had the highest number of football banning orders.




34% (-189) decrease in new football banning orders imposed Steady decline in football banning orders in force

Experimental statistics -Reported incidents at football fixtures

In the 2019/20 season, there were **2,663 regulated domestic matches**, and at **969** (36%) of these there were reported incidents. Whilst this proportion was similar to the previous season (33%), the number of reported incidents has decreased by 4%.



*For the first time, verified incidents of hate crime attributable to a designated fixture reported to the UKFPU by Kick It Out and The Football Association, including online incidents. These have previously only been recorded at the discretion of the police force receiving the report and therefore data are not comparable over time.
