## INTRODUCTION

On 24 December 2020, an agreement was reached between the UK and the EU setting out the UK's future relationship with the EU. This is the first free trade agreement the EU has ever reached based on zero tariffs and zero quotas and it's fantastic news for families and businesses in every part of the UK.


Now that the transition period is over, new rules for business with Europe are here. The Government is committed to supporting everyone across the UK to adapt to these new rules.


# ACTIONS TO TAKE TO KEEP YOUR LOCAL BUSINESSES MOVING

New rules for business with Europe are here.

There are a number of actions that businesses must take to adapt. Businesses need to follow new rules on exports, imports, tariffs, data and hiring.

# **ACTIONS TO KEEP YOUR BUSINESS MOVING**

Topic	Action	Guidance
Business travel	Business travellers may need to apply for a visa, work permit or other documentation before travelling to the EU / EEA / Switzerland from 1 January 2021. If you plan to stay longer than 90 in 180 days, or are carrying out activities not covered by a country's visa-waiver list, you may need a visa, work permit or other documentation. Whatever you are doing, we advise you to check the rules of the relevant Member State to find out if you need to apply. Businesses that employ staff from the EU	The way you hire from the EU has changed. Freedom of movement between the EU and UK has ended and the UK has introduced a new points-based immigration system.  If you want to hire anyone from outside the UK's resident labour market, you must be a Home Office licenced sponsor. This includes recruiting people from the EU.  Anyone coming to the UK to work will need a job offer from a licenced sponsor in advance and will need to meet certain skills and salary criteria.  The new system doesn't apply when hiring Irish citizens, or EU citizens eligible to apply to the EU Settlement Scheme. ## TALK TO YOUR LOCAL BUSINESS ABOUT BREXIT NEW RULES

Many of the Brexit new rules relate to business. It is vital that we help them to adapt to these. SME readiness is crucial, as small businesses employ nearly half of the UK workforce and their turnover represents a third of our GDP.

Businesses who missed the Brexit Transition deadline must take the necessary actions for the new regulatory environment.

We urge you to reach out to businesses in your local area to:

- Alert them that new rules came into force on 1 January 2021.
- Help them to understand what the changes mean for them.
- Direct them to <u>GOV.UK/transition</u> to check what they need to do now.





## NARRATIVE FOR BUSINESS

The UK has left the EU and new rules for business with the EU came into force on 1 January 2021.


Even though we have secured a deal, doing business with Europe has changed. You need to follow new rules on exports, imports, tariffs, data and hiring. Unless you have checked that you are ready, your business may face disruption.

We urge all businesses to visit **GOV.UK/transition** to take action now, get your personalised list of actions and subscribe to find out when things change.

We recognise that this means a period of change for businesses, at a time when everyone has been responding to the unprecedented coronavirus pandemic, but this is an unparalleled opportunity for the UK to do things differently and better, and create the blueprint for our growing prosperity through the 21st century.

To take advantage of the UK's new trading relationship with the EU and keep your business moving, you will have to make a number of changes. These changes will ensure continued flow of people, data, goods and services between the UK and the EU.

## BREXIT: ACTIONS BUSINESSES SHOULD TAKE NOW

Businesses that deal with Europe, who are not ready for these changes, could risk serious disruption.

- Head to GOV.UK/transition now and use the Brexit Checker Tool to get a personalised list of actions for your business.
- While the deal with the EU means zero tariffs and zero quotas, businesses still need to be ready for **changes to trade and customs procedures** with Europe. For trade with countries outside the EU, check for any changes to tariffs.
- From 1 January 2021, you'll need to make customs declarations when exporting goods to the EU. You can make the declarations yourself, but most businesses use **an intermediary** like a courier, freight forwarder or customs agent.
- We have taken measures to allow traders time to adjust to new processes. We have introduced new border controls in three stages up until 1 July 2021, and agreed with the EU to temporarily simplify **Rules of Origin procedures** for 12 months to the end of December 2021 by implementing a 12 month waiver on supplier declarations.
- However, you'll need to take some key actions now, like making sure you have an EORI number starting with GB, checking the new rules for importing and exporting goods and being confident that your goods meet origin rules before claiming preference. If exporting, you'll also need to check that the EU business you're exporting to is also ready.
- If you're due to travel to the EU for work, you may need a visa or work permit.
- If you receive personal data from the EU for business use, you may need to take action on data protection. Find out more at **GOV.UK/transition**
- From 1 January, if you want to **hire from outside the UK**, including from the EU, you must be a Home Office licenced sponsor under the UK's new points-based immigration system. The new system doesn't apply when hiring Irish citizens, or EU citizens already living in the UK.
- You may need to have your UK **professional qualification** officially recognised if you want to work in a regulated profession in the EEA or in Switzerland.

#### Actions for businesses who move goods into, out of, or through Northern Ireland.

- On January 1 the Northern Ireland Protocol came into force. There will be special provisions which only apply in Northern Ireland so if you move goods into, out of, or through Northern Ireland make sure you check the latest Northern Ireland Protocol guidance.
- If you move goods between Great Britain and Northern Ireland, the free-to-use Trader Support Service will guide you through any changes linked to the implementation of the Northern Ireland Protocol. Sign up online.



# Here are a series of FAQs relating to Brexit that can be shared directly with your local area or published on your website.

#### What do i need to know about Brexit?

- The UK left the EU on 31st January 2020 and we entered into a Transition Period until 31st December 2020.
- This is a period of time in which we were no longer a member of the EU but continued to be subject to EU rules and a member of the single market and customs union, while the negotiations on our future relationship with the EU were taking place.
- On the 24 December, a deal was agreed, which fully delivers on what the British public voted for in the referendum and in last year's General Election. It takes back control of our laws, borders, money and fisheries, and ends any role for the European Court.
- This deal is the first free trade agreement the EU has ever reached based on zero tariffs and zero quotas and it's fantastic news for families and businesses in every part of the UK.
- Now that the transition period is over and the UK has left the single market and customs union, new rules are here, and came into force from 1 January 2021.
- This involves a series of changes and opportunities for businesses.

#### What does the deal mean for business?

- The deal we have negotiated secures preferential market access to the EU for UK businesses whilst securing the UK's status as an independent and sovereign country.
- It ensures that there will be no tariffs or quotas for trade in goods with the EU and locks in long-term market access commitments for trade in services.
- Even though we have secured a deal, the way we trade with the EU has changed.

#### Do I need to do anything?

 Yes, you do. The new rules are here, bringing about a series of changes and opportunities for which we all need to adapt. The best way to find out what you need to do is to visit
 GOV.UK/transition. You can answer a few short questions and receive a

# I already did some of the actions when you asked me to prepare in the past. Do I have to do them again?

Yes - we update our guidance on a regular basis, so to ensure you know what is changing, go to **GOV.UK/transition**, use our Brexit Checker tool and make sure you are registered for updates.

# What are the key actions I might need to take to adjust to the new rules?

- The actions the public and business owners need to take vary based on their circumstances. Some of the key actions include:
- Making sure you are able to travel to the EU and EFTA states, for example by getting comprehensive travel insurance, ensuring your passport is valid, and checking your roaming policy with your mobile phone provider.
- If you want to travel to the EU and EFTA states with your pet, contact your vet at least 1 month before you travel.
- Making sure your business is ready to export or import from/to the EU, for example by getting an EORI number or registering with the relevant Customs Authority.
- Key actions that businesses and individuals need to take can be found on GOV.UK/transition.

# Are all the actions that businesses and individuals need to take online on GOV.UK?

- Yes, we have added the key actions you can take now into one place on GOV.UK/transition.
- Here, you can complete the 'Brexit Checker tool', find out actions to take and register for updates. Additional guidance may be provided later in the year.

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## CITIZENS FAQS

#### Do I need to do anything differently when visiting the EU?

Yes. Unprepared UK citizens could see their planned travel to the EU delayed or adversely affected. You need to:

- Check your passport is valid for travel to the EU and if it's not, renew your passport to make sure you can travel as planned. Visit GOV.UK/checkpassport.
- Make sure you get comprehensive travel insurance with healthcare cover for travel to the EU.
- · Check you have the right documents to drive in the EU.
- Rules around mobile roaming in the EU will change and your mobile provider may charge you more for calls or data when abroad, though many have said they won't. Check roaming policies with your mobile provider before travelling to the EU.
- If you want to travel to the EU with your pet, contact a vet at least 1 month before you travel.

#### I'm a UK citizen living in the EU. What do I need to do?

- Register / apply for residency in the country you currently live.
- Make sure your passport is valid when applying for residency in the EU member state where you live.
- Register for healthcare in the country you currently live.
- Exchange your UK driving licence for a local one.
- You can check what you specifically need to do at <u>GOV.UK/transition</u>.
- You can also sign up for 'Living in Guide' alerts

#### I'm an EU citizen living in the UK. What do I need to do?

- If you are a European Economic Area or Swiss citizen living in the UK you can apply for Settled Status from now until 30 June 2021.
- The EU Settlement Scheme means you can continue to live and work in the UK. Apply now at <u>GOV.UK/eusettledstatus</u>
- You can check what you specifically need to do at <u>GOV.UK/transition</u>.

# Does this apply to me if I'm living in Scotland, Wales, or Northern Ireland?

Yes. You can check what you need to do at <u>GOV.UK/transition</u>.

# I'm a British citizen / Irish citizen. Will my Common Travel Area rights continue after the Transition Period?

- The Common Travel Area (CTA) pre-dates the UK and Ireland's membership of the European Union and will continue beyond Brexit.
- The UK Government and the Irish Government are firmly committed to the continuity of the CTA.
- Under the CTA British and Irish nationals have a unique status and can enjoy a range of reciprocal rights in each other's countries.
- The CTA arrangements allow both British and Irish nationals to travel freely within this special area; this will not change.
- Irish citizens in the UK and British citizens in Ireland have the right to work, study, and access social security and public services in each other's countries. These rights will be maintained under the CTA.

#### What is the Withdrawal Agreement?

- The Withdrawal Agreement sets out the terms of the UK's withdrawal from the EU and provides for a deal on citizens' rights.
- You will be covered by the Withdrawal Agreement if you are a UK national who was lawfully residing in another EU country when the Transition Period, ended on 31 December 2020.
- The Withdrawal Agreement secures your rights and allows you to stay in the EU country where you live after 31 January 2020. You will continue to have broadly the same entitlements to work, study and access public services and benefits as before the UK left the EU.
- You and your family may need to apply for a residence status to confirm that you were already resident in the EU country you live in before 31 December 2020. You will have until at least 30 June 2021 to do this.

## **BUSINESS FAQs**

#### I'm a business. Do I need to do anything specific?

Yes. Many of the changes and opportunities that are coming at the end of the year relate to business. Your business will have to make a number of changes to ensure continued flow of people, data, goods and services between the UK and the EU.

These actions are required for businesses:

- If you sell goods to the EU you must adjust to the new customs procedures.
- If you travel to the EU for work purposes you will need to check if you need a visa or work permit and apply if necessary.
- If you employ overseas nationals you must be a Home Office licenced sponsor under the UK's new points-based immigration system.
- If you are a UK business or organisation that receives personal data from the EU for business use, you may need to take action on data protection.
- You may need to have your UK professional qualification officially recognised if you want to work in a regulated profession in the EEA or in Switzerland.

# Will I be able to hire EU nationals in the future, and under what conditions?

- Yes but the way you hire from the EU is changing. Free movement has ended and the UK has introduced a new points-based immigration system.
- If you want to hire anyone from outside the UK you must be a Home Office licenced sponsor. This includes recruiting people from the EU.
- Anyone coming to the UK to work will need a job offer from a licenced sponsor in advance, and will need to meet certain skills and salary criteria.

# How can my company continue to trade between Great Britain and Northern Ireland?

- If you move goods into Northern Ireland check the guidance and find help and support <u>here.</u>
  - The UK Government has launched a free-to-use Trader Support Service which will help businesses and traders prepare for any changes that will affect your business if you move goods into Northern Ireland: <a href="Register">Register</a> for the Trader Support Service.
- The Movement Assistance Scheme will help businesses meet new requirements for moving animals, plants and associated products from Great Britain to Northern Ireland. This includes advice to businesses through a dedicated helpline and means traders will not need to pay certification costs: Get support for your business.

# My business is primarily based in the EU - what do I need to do?

- If you run an EU-based business, you need to check the new rules and adjust to the changes now in place so that you can continue trading with the UK.
- Rules are changing and there will be border requirements placed on the movement of goods between the EU and UK.
