Introduction

Cambodia is in southeast Asia, bordered to the west and northwest by Thailand, to the northeast by Laos, to the east by Vietnam and to the southwest by the Gulf of Thailand. A former protectorate of France, and occupied by the Japanese during World War II, Cambodia gained independence in 1953 when it became the Kingdom of Cambodia. The government was overthrown by the Khmer Rouge in 1975, and in 1976 the country was re-named Kampuchea (although this name change was not recognized by HMG). In 1979 the People's Republic of Kampuchea was established after the Khmer Rouge were defeated. In 1989 the country was named the State of Cambodia, until 1993 when the monarchy was restored and it became the Kingdom of Cambodia.

Geographical names policy

It is PCGN policy for Cambodia to romanize Khmer names, taken from official sources, ideally produced by the Cambodian Department of Geography, according to the BGN/PCGN (1972) Romanization System for Khmer (a modified version of Cambodia's Service Géographique Khmère (SGK) 1959 system), with the exception of the names of provinces and province centres, for which PCGN recommends using anglicised (simplified) spellings⁵.

In 1995, the Ministry of Land Management and Urban Planning of Cambodia, Department of Geography, developed a new romanization system (modified in 1997) that is similar to the 1959 SGK system, but with no diacritical marks and a number of differences in the treatment of vowels. This new romanization system

has not yet been implemented in Cambodia and it will not be considered for adoption for HMG use until PCGN finds evidence that the new standardised system is officially in place and is being consistently used as a means of romanizing Khmer geographical names. Anglicised forms are commonly found in Cambodia, and until the new romanization system has been widely adopted, PCGN recommends that these spellings be used on HMG products for first-order administrative divisions and their administrative centres.

The [NGA GEONet Names Server \(GNS\)](#) may also be used as a source for names in Cambodia⁶.

Language

Khmer is the official language of Cambodia⁷. It is spoken by the majority (96.3 %⁸) of the population. French, which was once the language of government, is now only spoken by some older Cambodians. English is used in the press and is the medium of instruction in some universities; street signs are often bilingual in Khmer and English.

Characters can be manually input into Microsoft Word documents by typing in these character codes and then holding down the ALT key and pressing /x/. The code will change to the required character. The letter can be copied and pasted into other programmes if required. Alternatively, the 'Insert – Symbol' command can be used; the code can be entered into the 'Character code' box which will show the corresponding letter. Territorial and toponymic issues

Thailand and Cambodia dispute ownership of land near the 11th century border temple, Prasat Preăh Vihéar, a UNESCO World Heritage Site¹⁰. It is located in the Dangrek Mountains that form a natural border between Thailand and Cambodia. A 1962 International Court of Justice judgement awarded the temple to Cambodia and, as the dispute continued, this ruling was reiterated by a further ICJ judgement in 2013. On UK government products, the temple should be labelled using the Cambodian name **Prasat Preăh Vihéar** or with the English generic term **Preăh Vihéar Temple** if required.

The boundary alignment is also disputed in an area close to the Cambodian border town of Poipet¹¹. The Cambodian name with the conventional name in brackets **Paôy Pêt (Poipet)** should be shown.

Other boundary disputes exist between Cambodia and Thailand, particularly along the Dangrek Mountains. The *de jure* boundary should be shown in each of these cases with the correct local names used on either side of the *de jure* boundary.

Administrative structure

Cambodia is divided into 25 first-order administrative divisions (ADM1s): the capital autonomous municipality (Khmer: *krông*) Phnom Penh, plus 24 provinces (Khmer: *khet*). As mentioned in the Geographical Names Policy section on page 1, the PCGN recommended name is the locally found anglicised (simplified) name for these names.
