Vaccine update

Record levels of flu vaccine uptake in 2020 to 2021

This year saw the roll out of the biggest NHS flu vaccination programme ever, with the aim of offering protection to as many eligible people as possible during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Public Health England and NHS England and NHS Improvement national Influenza teams would like to extend a huge thank you to all those involved for your tremendous work in delivering the most successful programme ever this season. This was despite the many challenges and complexities that you faced during the pandemic.

Despite these challenges, at the end of January 2021 NHS services had vaccinated a record 80.7% of those aged 65 years and over in England. This is the highest uptake

ever achieved for this group and exceeds the World Health Organization uptake ambition of 75%.

For frontline healthcare workers and 2 and 3-year olds, the highest ever recorded levels of flu vaccine uptake have also been achieved.

Flu vaccine uptake rates are higher than the same time last season for all other eligible groups. This includes an uptake rate of 52.4% for those in clinical at-risk groups, which is the highest level achieved in the last seven seasons.

For GP patients and frontline healthcare workers the last publication of monthly data for the season will be on 25 March 2021. All data is provisional, with final end-of-season data published in the PHE annual reports on 24 June 2021.



Supporting and guiding someone with sight loss

Communication

- . Always verbally introduce yourself and speak directly to the person
- When speaking to someone always use their name (if known
- If you don't know their name it can be helpful to say, "Hello I am Can I help you with anything"?
- Speak and avoid relying on non-verbal gestures such as pointing or nodding/shaking your head.
- Don't be scared to offer help if you think the person might want assistance if you are unsure just ask them.
 Give the person a little extra time to respond.
- . Always tell the person if you are going to leave them alone
- Always tell the person if you are going to hand them over to someone else.

Verbal Guiding (allows for 2M social distancing rule)

- . If support is required, ask the person if they want you to walk in front, side,
- Provide the person with clear verbal instruction, describing the route you are taking, and avoiding all obstacles.
 Go at the person's pace and give enough time to warn of changes in direction or potential obstacles.
- Tell the person what you are doing and explain each step especially if it
 involves physical contact.
- Follow these tips for people arriving at or leaving the centre.

It's essential that everyone who comes for a vaccine feels safe, supported and understood. The Royal National Institute of Blind People have free training available to staff and volunteers working on the vaccine programme to help you feel more confident in supporting people with sight loss.

You can pick from three short online training modules covering communication, how to guide, and the experiences of people with sight loss, relevant to your time in the vaccination programme and beyond.

Simply visit www.enetlearn.com/vaccinesupport and click the "register" button to access the training. If you don't have much time, you can download a quick "handy tips" document for working with people with sight loss and display it in staff areas of your vaccination centre.

There are 1500 places and we hope that as many of our vaccination workforce will have time to share the handy tips guide and take up the offer of training so kindly provided by the RNIB and supported nationally by our devolved administrations, a truly UK wide initiative. First come, first served basis, so do register as soon as possible. Training is only 20 minutes per unit for two units and 40 minutes for the final unit and counts as CPD.
