The aircraft was taking off on runway 28 during an air race organised by the Royal Aero Club's Record Racing and Rally Association.

After becoming airborne the aircraft flew along the extended centreline at low level to a point some 400 metres past the upwind end of the licensed runway, and on passing the first scatterpoint marker commenced a tight climbing turn to the left. The left wing made contact with a large hawthorn bush located behind the marker, and the outboard section of the wing received substantial damage. The flight was discontinued and the aircraft made a safe landing back at Leicester.

The pilot stated that he did not consider that this event constituted a "reportable accident" as defined in The Civil Aviation (Investigation of Accidents) Regulations 1983, Regulation 2(1) (b). However, the outboard section of the left wing required the replacement of the upper and lower skins, ribs, wing leading edge, wing tip and associated fitting fuel tank vent, and as a precautionary measure, replacement of the main wing attachment bolts.
