



# Helpdesk Report: Behaviour Change in Under 2's

Date: July 2010

**Query:** To conduct a short literature review of the evidence for using behaviour change communication, e.g. mass media, IPC etc, to impact positively on caring practices (breastfeeding, complimentary feeding, hygiene, IYCF) on the under 2's in India (or South Asia if evidence limited). Also include evidence of successful behaviour change in India mobilised by BCC/IPC campaigns to improve child underweight rates and infant mortality.
