What is AFCAP?

- AFCAP is an initiative to use research evidence to promote the development of sustainable, least-cost, all-weather, locally-owned access for poor rural communities
- AFCAP is a 5-year programme funded by the UK government, with a budget of £7.5 million with same amount contributed by partner governments
- AFCAP implementation started in June 2008
- AFCAP develops research collaboration between a few African countries (currently Mozambique, Malawi, Tanzania, Kenya, Ethiopia)
- AFCAP funds research, knowledge-exchange and training





Progress to date

- developed dialogues about research and collaboration with AFCAP in 11 countries.
- established national ownership of AFCAP through AFCAP National Coordinators and AFCAP National Steering Groups in 5 countries.
- organised consultation processes on research priorities that will inform the AFCAP research agenda in 5 countries.
- identified significant demand for Community Access research in the participating countries.
- Contributed to development of wider research focus in government activity in Ethiopia





Main Areas of Demand

- Design standards for low volume roads
- Use of marginal materials in road construction
- Dealing with black cotton soils and sand
- Assessing proprietary chemical stabilisers
- Maintenance systems for low volume roads
- Capacity development in local road construction industry
- Improving accessibility in rural areas including transport services.
- Better understanding of the interactions between rural access and other development agendas


















Low Volume Sealed Roads

- AFCAP support:
- Promoting and institutionalising SADC Guidelines (Portuguese and French translations).
- Design Manual and Standard Bidding Documents for LVRs in Ethiopia.
- Demonstration sites using LVSR approach in Ethiopia,
 Tanzania, Mozambique and Kenya.
- On-site contractor training on surfacing options in Mozambique

- Support for a district maintenance systems project in Tanzania to provide in-depth understanding and guidance










Condition Monitoring System for low traffic roads Mozambique Road Fund.

Support of Research Capacity

- AFCAP is supporting the development of a research consortium on the interaction between rural community access and the MDG on maternal mortality
- This is bringing together a multi-disciplinary research team from:
 - across 6 African countries.
 - Across health and transport specialist areas
 - Across researchers and ministries responsible for implementation
- Initial focus on:
 - Development of 3million EURO proposal for EC funding





Summary

- AFCAP is active in Mozambique, Ethiopia, Malawi, Tanzania and Kenya but will expand to W Africa with extra resources.
- Demand for research and development in the area of rural access is overwhelming
- Need to work in partnership with other organisation to make a collective argument for greater resource in this area
