WHAT IS IFRTD

- IFRTD is the International Forum for Rural Transport and Development
- A global network of individuals and organizations working together towards improved access and mobility for the rural poor in developing countries
- Currently having approx. 4,000 members
- 30 National Forum Groups
- Based in London, UK with 4 regional coordinator offices: (Eastern & Southern Africa (in Kenya), West & Central Africa (in Cameroon), Asia and the Pacific (in Sri Lanka), and Latin America (in Peru)
- Currently supported by the Swiss Agency for Development Cooperation (SDC), and the Swedish International Development Cooperation Agency (Sida) as core donors.



IFRTD APPROACH: A NETWORKED RESEARCH APPROACH

- A major challenge for researchers and those supporting research activities related to development and poverty reduction is to ensure that findings are relevant to and taken up by poor people and those who work with them.
- In response to this challenge the Forum has developed a networked research methodology that brings together people from different countries and contexts, and builds ownership and communication into the design of the research programme itself.
- This has demonstrated several significant impacts:
 - Encourages learning and sharing across geographical and hierarchical boundaries.
 - Harnesses local knowledge, experience and latent research skills.
 - Creates national ownership of research findings.
 - Stimulates debate at local and national level.
 - Creates opportunities to raise awareness of the issues and commits a wide range of stakeholders to their resolution.







- Already some essential knowledge and understanding on rural transport have been generated, but still
- Example of thematic knowledge generation and sharing
 - Transport and rural off-farm activities
 - Transport and rural investment (http://www.worldbank.org/id/rica)
 - Transport and disability
 - Cross border trade and transport corridors
 - Rural transport hubs
 - Accessibility for disaster prevention
- Advocacy and partnership
 - Sensitizing international donors
 - Partnership with development organizations and NGOs
 - Capacity improvement of National Forum Groups to make a change



Few Activities in Asia and the Pacific

- Facilitate South- South direct knowledge & experience transfer (e.g. between Bangladesh and Sri Lanka, Nepal and Sri Lanka, Bangladesh and Nepal, India and Sri Lanka)
- Maintaining a network of members and organisations for mutual benefits
- Provide information and links for technical and other information.
- Working closely with regional institutions (e.g. ILO, SEACAP, gTKP, ADB, Practical Action, Helvetas etc) and develop high agenda for RT.
- Promote inclusive transport that enhances the mobility of People with Disabilities, Communities vulnerable to disasters and utilization of good practices of sustainable Rural Road Maintenance and RT services.
- Facilitate South-South knowledge transfer of best practices of mountainous Transport interventions (from Nepal to other countries) with Nepal Networks (NFRTD and NTBF) with Helvetas Nepal.
