Medreich has received several complaints that the child-resistant caps on the above mentioned products are difficult to open. This follows the introduction of a new child-resistant cap with a red tamper-evident ring earlier this year. A very small number of packs have an incompatibility between the cap and the bottle.

Additionally, the new child-resistant caps with a red tamper-evident ring require more pressure to open for the first time compared to child-resistant caps with an induction seal.

Please follow the handling instructions below to avoid difficulty in opening the child-resistant cap, and see photos on page 2 for illustration.

- 1) Place the bottle on a flat, firm surface.
- 2) To break the tamper-evident ring, apply a moderate force to push down on the top of the cap and turn the cap anti-clockwise. <u>Take care to ensure that the force is uniform</u>, as a non-uniform force may cause incomplete breakage of the tamper-evident ring, preventing opening of the closure. The red tamper-evident ring is not visible on the unopened bottle.
- After reconstitution, <u>press the cap down</u> from the top and turn the cap clockwise while <u>continuing</u> <u>to press down</u>. This will ensure the child-resistant cap is properly closed, and eliminate any issue related to leakage.
- 4) To re-open the cap, turn the cap anti-clockwise whilst pressing down on the cap.
- 5) If the correct opening technique is not used, the cap will rotate and will not open.
