REQUEST FOR INFORMATION: EMAILS, DOCUMENTS AND MINUTES OF MEETINGS MENTIONING THE MARINE ENGLAND REGULATORY SERVICE-LIMITED TO BETWEEN 1 SEPTEMBER 2012 AND 6 SEPTEMBER 2013

Thank you for your request for information received on 6 September 2013. This response covers your requests to Defra and the Centre for Environment Fisheries and Aquaculture Science (CEFAS) for emails, documents and minutes of meetings which relate to the Marine England Regulatory Service between 1 September 2012 and 6 September 2013. Similar requests made to the Environment Agency and Natural England have been dealt separately. As you know, we have handled your request under the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (FOIA).

I enclose a copy of the information you requested. Defra holds two documents which made references to the Marine England Regulatory Service.

These were minutes of a meeting between the Marine Management Organisation and Defra on 14 March 2013 and a paper prepared for the Marine Programme Board on 20 March 2013.

The minutes of the meeting on 14 March recorded the following information:

'Red Tape Challenge has provided a useful opportunity to review how MMO works with other regulators. A 'Marine England Regulatory Service' (MERS) paper will set out options to work more closely together in the future. The MERS paper will propose the establishment of a formal operating agreement between regulators, the Marine Management Organisation, Natural England, the Environment Agency. Additionally, these three 'Arms Length Bodies' plus the Forestry Commission are issuing next month a "Single





Voice" 2-page joint 'offer and asks' directed at Local Enterprise Partnerships, City Deals, and Enterprise Zones.'

The Marine England Regulatory Service was also referred to in a paper prepared by the Centre for Environment, Fisheries, Aquaculture and Science, the Marine Management Organisation, the Environment Agency, Natural England and the Joint Nature Conservation Committee for the Marine Programme Board meeting on 20 March 2013. Please see RFI – DOC 1 attached. The Coastal Concordat discussed at paragraph 3.6 was recently reviewed and endorsed by the Cabinet Office's Reducing Regulation sub-Committee. The Concordat is to be launched at a Focus on Enforcement event on 11 November 2013.
