

**1) I would be most grateful if you could provide the following information:****The pass rates for October, November and December 2011 for the approved driving instructor (ADI) parts one, two and three tests**

In the table below, you can find the national pass rates for the ADI part one, two and three tests for October, November and December 2011.

<b>Month/test</b>	<b>ADI part one</b>	<b>ADI part two</b>	<b>ADI part three</b>
<b>October 2011</b>	49.57%	54.1%	33.2%
<b>November 2011</b>	52.44%	49.8%	28.9%
<b>December 2011</b>	52.40%	48.1%	29.8%

Please note that the pass rate relating to ADI part two tests for December 2011 is correct as of 31 January 2012 but this should only be treated as provisional information. This is because all the information of tests conducted recently will still be in the process of data capture and not yet uploaded onto our reporting system.

You should also note that owing to ongoing activity to address a data anomaly, we have a 92 to 98% confidence in the accuracy of the information relating to ADI part three tests from October to December 2011. Whilst we hold this information in paper form, it would take in excess of 24 hours to update the database with all of the relevant records. We are continuing to work on this issue, so it is likely that the figures provided will be subject to revision.

To provide accurate ADI part three information is exempt from release under section 12 (1) (cost of compliance exceeds appropriate limit) of the FoIA. A full breakdown of this exemption can be found at Annex B.

The appropriate limit, as prescribed by the Freedom of Information and Data Protection (Appropriate Limit and Fees) Regulations 2004, is £600 for Central Government and £450 for other public authorities, with staff costs calculated at a rate of £25 per hour. When calculating whether the appropriate limit is exceeded, authorities can take account of the costs of determining whether the information is held, locating and retrieving the information, and extracting the information from other documents. They cannot take account of the costs involved with considering whether information is exempt under the Act.

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
