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Benefit Fraud and Error campaign

- 1. A new Benefit Fraud and Error campaign from the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP), piloted in six areas was launched on 3 January 2014. The pilot locations are Southwark, Hounslow, Blackburn, Blackpool, Epping Forest and Cardiff.
- 2. Benefit claimants are being warned to disclose changes in circumstances as part of a campaign aimed at cutting the £1.6 billion annual cost of overpayments.
- 3. Claimants in six pilot areas will be warned they could face a fine of up to £2,000 for not disclosing any changes in their circumstances which could affect their benefit claim, such as having found a job or moved in with a partner.
- 4. The six week campaign will use adverts, posters, social media and direct mail letters.
- 5. Welfare reform minister Lord Freud said the aim was to stop fraud and overpayment, "before they even happen".
- 6. Jobcentre Plus partnership managers will be contacting local partners and stakeholders in the pilot areas, to raise awareness of the campaign and enlist support to amplify it.
- 7. Local authorities (LAs) in the pilot areas can help support this campaign by encouraging customers to:
 - report any change of circumstances
 - contact us if they aren't sure what they need to tell us about
 - look on GOV.UK for more information or talk to Jobcentre Plus

Disability Living Allowance (DLA) to Personal Independence Payment (PIP): reassessment areas extend

- 8. As reported in HB Direct Issue 142, we are inviting DLA claimants living in Wales, the Midlands and East Anglia, to claim PIP if:
 - their disability-related needs change

- they reach age 16
- they reach the end of their award
- 9. This is known as reassessment.

10. From 13 January 2014, we extended these areas to postcodes beginning:

- DG (Dumfries and Galloway)
- EH (Edinburgh)
- TD (Galashiels)
- ML (Motherwell)
- 11. From 3 February 2014, we will further extend these areas to postcodes beginning:
 - CA (Carlisle)
 - DL (Darlington)
 - HG (Harrogate)
 - LA (Lancaster)
 - YO (York)
- 12. A postcode map is available as part of the PIP toolkit for support organisations, together with tailored communications and guidance for LAs.
- 13. Alongside the phased introduction of reassessment activity, we continue to take new claims to PIP across Great Britain.
- 14. An individual can also choose to claim PIP instead of DLA if they live in a reassessment area.

HB decisions by the Upper Tribunal

15. Decision Making and Appeals Leeds is aware of the following HB cases that have been decided by the Upper Tribunal:

- CH/466/2011: Disabled child requiring a bedroom separate from sibling(s). Upper Tribunal substituted a decision following Court of Appeal decision in Burnip and others. Useful discussion of implications/legislative changes following Burnip
- CH/1572/2013: Possible official error overpayments but further evidence required from LA as to changes to Jobseeker's Allowance/Council Tax Benefit (CTB)/HB entitlement. Found as fact claimant had reported changes, and also that he and landlord were unaware they were being overpaid
- CH/1926/2013: Human Rights. 50/50 care of child. Indirect discrimination against men justified
- CH/2042/2011: Semis occupied by claimant and family are one dwelling. LA cannot impose local rules on time limits on claimants for providing information – it is in the legislation (paragraph 24); discussion on strike out rules (paragraphs 50 – 59 especially 57); jurisdiction following strike out (paragraphs 40 – 44); and the role of the (LA) respondent (paragraphs 62 – 63 and 71)
- CH/1711/2012: Overpayment due to tenant vacating property and not notifying anybody. No reason for landlord to know therefore Regulation 101(2) does not apply
- CH/1084/2013: Overpayment due to tenant vacating property and not notifying anybody. No findings of fact about how/when landlord could have known/knew tenant had left, especially in view of previous action against landlord for harassment
- CH/4148/12: CTB. No overpayment because no liability for Council Tax. The periodic tenancy was either a monthly or weekly one therefore not granted for a term of at least six months
- CH/2043/11: CTB. Two adjoining properties to be treated as a single dwelling as family reside in both
