

The number of car hazard perception tests (HPTs) conducted and passed by attempt (first, second, third, etc) in 2011/12 based only on those attempts taken in 2011/12

In the table below, you can find the number of car HPTs conducted and passed by attempt in 2011/12. This information is based only on those attempts taken in 2011/12.

Please note that:

- the information counts the attempts the candidate had at passing or failing their HPT; therefore if a candidate passed a car hazard perception test on the first attempt but failed it on their second attempt, they'd be included in both the attempt one pass and conducted statistics and the attempt two conducted statistics.
- both the car multiple choice (MC) test and HPT must be passed at the same time to pass the car theory test; therefore a candidate may have passed the car HPT but not the MC test and would need to sit both parts again.
