STATUS LETTERS

- 1. A status letter gives an opinion about a person's British nationality status.
- 2. An application for a status letter should be made on form NS.
- 3. A fee is charged for the issue of a status letter. Current fee levels are displayed on the UKBA website.
- 4. Status letters are not certificates of nationality. They merely record UKBA's opinion that a person possesses a form of British nationality. Only the courts can determine conclusively whether that person is actually a British national. For this reason, great care should be taken when status letters are issued.

5. The effects of Independence Acts

5.1 Care should be taken not to overlook the effects of Independence Acts on the citizenship of persons born in, or connected with, former dependent territories. Where a person retained British nationality on independence, a paragraph explaining this should be included in the status letter.

6. Evidence required

6.1 Evidence required to establish a claim to British nationality is given in the relevant chapter of Volume 1.
