- * Please disclose how many positive test results for other other drugs tested for were found in meat from horses slaughtered in the UK in 2013, indicating which drugs. Please disclose any follow-up action.

Thank you for your email, dated 22 January 2014. We are dealing with your request under the Freedom of Information Act 2000.

Your Request

You asked:

- how many positive test results for phenylbutazone were found in meat from horses slaughtered in the UK in 2013
- in each case any follow-up action (including tracing the meat and any necessary removal from sale etc.)
- how many positive test results for other drugs tested for were found in meat from horses slaughtered in the UK in 2013, indicating which drugs with any follow-up action.

Our Reply

Positive test results for phenylbutazone in 2013

The Food Standards Agency implemented scheme, testing 100% of horses for residues of phenylbutazone with effect from 30 January 2013, found residues of phenbylbutazone in 86 of all horses tested.

Follow-up action

Officers from the Animal Health and Veterinary Laboratories Agency carried out follow up investigations in the majority of cases. With effect from 11 February 2013 none of the horses found to be non-compliant entered the food chain and were disposed of in accordance with legislation. Prior to this date, the FSA recalled the products for the six horses found to contain residues of phenylbutazone under the 'Rapid Alert System for Food and Feed' that enables the FSA to recall a product from the market across the EU.

A summary of the overall findings is set out in the table below:

Number	Outcome of investigation
12	Cross contamination of feed, where a horse has had access to medicated feed containing phenylbutazone where it had not been prescribed for that particular horse.
1	Fraudulent passport, being investigated further by Trading Standards.
1	Phenylbutzone administered to wrong horse in error.
14	Investigations could not establish the cause of the residue
7	Horse originated from Northern Ireland, therefore, AHVLA officers unable to carry out investigation.
1	Passport missing, unable to take any follow up action.
23	Horses not signed out of the food chain in the horse passport, usually due to owners being unaware of the requirements of legislation.
27	Investigations ongoing.

Other drugs tested

The VMD implement the statutory surveillance programme in accordance with Council Directive 96/23/EC.

There were 131 samples taken under this programme during 2013.

Details of non-compliant samples are listed in the table below:

Number	Substance and amount found.	Follow up action
1	8400 μg/kg cadmium	Under investigation.
1	23 μg/kg alpha-nortestosterone	Animal in foal at time of sampling, no further action.
1	12 μg/kg alpha-nortestosterone 45 μg/kg bea-nortestosterone	Under investigation
