

I would like information showing the total number of motorcycle (module 2) tests taken and passed for each year between 2006 and 2010 (inclusive), split by age of applicant. I realise the test format has changed in the last two years into a modular format, but if I could have overall test passes, it would be much appreciated.

Please find at Annex B a table which shows the number of module two bike tests that were conducted and passed nationally for each calendar year from 2006 until 2010. These statistics have been broken down by age.

Please note that we have amalgamated and provided a total for the number of 16 and 17 year olds and a total for all those who were 70 and over. This is due to low numbers of people taking and/or passing the module two bike test in these categories. To release this information individually may lead to the identification of individuals and would be classed as their personal data. Personal data is exempt from release under section 40 (2) of the Freedom of Information Act, a copy of which is attached at Annex C.
