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Complementing the Leeds City Region Strategic Economic Plan and building on current activities, the four travel packages support economic growth by promoting sustainable travel options to increase access to employment and training opportunities, with emphasis on locations of high unemployment and health inequality across West Yorkshire. Building on the successful West Yorkshire Travel Plan Network and JobCentre Plus Partnership, the scheme will assist jobseekers, NEETs and young people into employment and training. Seamless door-to-door journeys by sustainable modes will be facilitated through further 'Smart Ticketing' developments to increase payment options. To increase physical activity, the programme will continue go:cycling and expand CityConnect's Best Foot Forward project to go:walking. Promotion of cycling through engagement activities to get more people cycling more often, as well as increasing physical activity through active travel, will work to reduce health inequality across West Yorkshire.

Go Smarter

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The biggest transport challenge in Tyne and Wear is congestion on the two main highway corridors, the A1 Western Bypass and A19. The package will encourage behaviour change in car commuters, through a business engagement programme and associated 'Toolkit of Measures', building on the progress already made in the current Go Smarter to Work programme; encourage behaviour change in parents and school pupils to increase the use of sustainable modes of travel for the 'school run', through the continued delivery of the popular Schools Go Smarter programme; improve travel information and marketing, supporting the LSTF capital package as part of the North East Strategic Economic Plan; and support Jobseekers, including young people, entering work and /or training, particularly where transport is a barrier. As well as contributing to economic growth, these measures will also reduce carbon, encourage healthy active travel and promote social inclusion – securing a sustainable economic recovery for Tyne and Wear.
