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# Farming Statistics - Livestock Populations at 1 December 2014, England

This release shows livestock numbers on agricultural holdings in England. These results are from the December Pigs Survey as at 1 December 2014, along with data from the administrative sources of the Cattle Tracing System (CTS) and the Annual Sheep and Goat (SAG) Inventory. Full details of these sources are provided in the methodological notes on page 7.

#### Key points:

#### Cattle (Table 1)

The total number of cattle and calves in England is 5.3 million in December 2014. This is a decrease of 0.3% since December 2013.

#### Pigs (Table 2)

The total number of pigs in England has increased by 1.5% since December 2013 to 3.7 million. Fattening pigs rose by 2.2% which was partly offset by a fall of 3.8% in breeding pigs.

#### Sheep (Table 3)

The total number of sheep and lambs in England rose by 4.5% between December 2013 and December 2014 to 10.8 million. The female breeding flock increased by 1.6% from 6.4 million in 2013 to 6.5 million in 2014.

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#### **Detailed results**

#### Cattle

The total number of cattle and calves in England is 5.3 million in December 2014. This was a decrease of 0.3% since December 2013 and is a return to a similar level recorded in 2012.




Figure 1: Female dairy and beef herds at 1 December 2010 to 2014

In recent years England's beef breeding herd has continued to decline reflecting concerns over profitability. The downward trend in the beef herd has continued in December 2014. However the decrease seen was smaller than in recent years with the beef herd falling by 0.6% since December 2013. Conversely the dairy sector is demonstrating a more optimistic outlook, increasing by 2.2% to 1.16 million in December 2014.

The female breeding herd is made up of dairy and beef cows over two years old with offspring and accounts for 48% of all female cattle in 2014.

# Pigs

The total number of pigs in England has increased by 1.5% since December 2013 to just under 3.7 million. With the breeding herd showing a 3.8% decrease, this rise was driven by a 2.2% increase in the number of fattening pigs, to almost 3.3 million, as the improvement in sow productivity continues.




Figure 2: Proportion of pigs in the breeding herd compared to the total number of fattening pigs

Data for pigs are provided for only those holdings considered to have a commercial level of agricultural activity. This allows data to be directly comparable to data from the June Survey of Agriculture and Horticulture. Commercial holdings are defined in the methodology section on pages 7 and 8.

## Sheep

The total number of sheep and lambs in England increased by 4.5% during 2014 to 10.8 million. England's female breeding flock remained steady increasing by 1.6% to just under 6.5 million. The 'Other sheep and lambs' category saw an increase in the population to 4.3 million, an increase of 9.3% over that period.




Figure 3: Total sheep and lambs, December 2010 – 2014

# Survey methodology

Data for this 2014 December livestock publication comes from a number of different sources.

# Cattle

Cattle results are sourced from the Cattle Tracing System (CTS). The data include returns from all holdings with cattle so are not subject to survey error. # Pigs

Pig data came from the December survey of Pigs, which is a small sample survey of farms that keep over 750 pigs. It is used to estimate the size of the pig herd in England at 1 December each year. The pig data were gathered using 300 paper forms, achieving a response rate of 84%, so the results for pigs are subject to a degree of sampling error.

Pig data relates to commercial holdings only. Commercial holdings are defined as those with significant levels of farming activity, i.e. holdings with more than five hectares of agricultural land, one hectare of orchards, 0.5 hectares of vegetables or 0.1 hectares of protected crops, or more than 10 cows, 50 pigs, 20 sheep, 20 goats or 1,000 poultry.

## Sheep

Sheep data came from the annual Sheep and Goat Inventory (an annual exercise requiring all sheep and goat keepers to record animals under their keepership at 1 December). It is an EU requirement to hold an annual inventory of sheep and goat keepers for livestock tracing and identification purposes. In England the inventory is held on 1 December each year. Sheep and goat keepers in England will receive either a paper form or an email request to complete their inventory in late November. Since 2010 the information collected by the inventory is used to estimate the size of the English sheep flock at 1 December. # Data analysis

The data for pigs and sheep are subject to rigorous validation checks which identify inconsistencies within the data or large year-on-year changes.

## Data notes

- All percentage changes are based on unrounded figures.
- Totals may not necessarily agree with the sum of their components due to rounding.

## Data uses and users

- The UK is required to supply estimates to Eurostat of livestock populations in December each year.
- This data also helps us monitor changes in livestock populations over time and the effects of e.g. CAP reform on the industry.

- The numbers are used to make forecasts of meat and milk production to inform industry of the availability of supply which affects prices.
- Livestock distributions across the UK also help assess the risk of veterinary disease and to control outbreaks.
