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# Modern Ships – Container Ship 400m long carries 18,340 containers Value - Ship: \$185 Million - Cargo:\$275 Million



#### **Traditional Seafarers**



- Deck and Technical Officers and Ratings
- Container Ship Typically 22
  - Captain
  - 3 Watch keepers
  - 6 Seamen
  - Chief Engineer
  - 3 Engineer/Electrical Officers
  - 3 Fitters
  - 3 Motormen
  - 2 Cook/Stewards
  - Cadets (under training)



# Modern Ships Cruise ship 361m long - 5,400 Passengers Value - Ship: \$1.4 Billion





#### **Traditional Seafarers**



- Deck and Technical Officers and Ratings
- Cruise Ship Around 90
  - Captain
  - 4 Day work officers
  - 6 Watch keepers
  - 30 Seamen
  - 10 security staff
  - Chief Engineer
  - 15 Engineer/Electrical Officers
  - 30 Technical Crew
  - Cadets (under training)



#### **Non-Traditional Seafarers**



- Hotel and Entertainment Staff
- Largest Cruise Ship Around 2, 290
  - Hotel Officers
  - Waiters
  - Bar Staff
  - Chefs and Galley Staff
  - Back of House Staff
  - Cabin Stewards
  - Entertainers
  - Shop Staff
  - Beauticians
  - Casino Staff





- FIRE PARTY
  - Very strenuous
  - Exhausted after 30 minutes
  - Heat can be an issue





- Wearing
- A fire suit
- ≻ CABA
- ➢ Fire Helmet





- May have to recover casualties
- From confined spaces
- Only two persons to lift





- Ratings are awaiting tasks which could include:
  - Carrying CABA bottles
  - Closing fire dampers
  - Acting as back up
  - Technical tasks
  - Rigging and operating hoses





- Deck and Technical Officers and Ratings
- Boat Preparation
- Boat Crew
- Launching Boats



- Hotel and Entertainment Staff
  - Forming part of a lifeboat crew
  - > Will be required to help up to 140 passengers





- Hotel and Entertainment Staff
  - Can perform a number of tasks mainly relating to looking after the passengers but a number of them involve physical effort.
    - Boundary Cooling using heavy hoses
    - Stretcher party with possible heavy casualties
    - > Messengers having to go up and down up to eighteen decks on foot
  - Emergency duties can change whilst onboard
  - Crewmember will not know their emergency position until they board
  - > All crew have to be assigned an emergency duty (SOLAS requirement)

- Hotel and Entertainment Staff
  - Can form part of the lifeboats crew
  - > Here helping to push the lifeboat away from the ships side





- Hotel and Entertainment Staff
  - Preparing Liferafts





- Hotel and Entertainment Staff
  - Pulling on lines preparing a liferaft





- Hotel and Entertainment Staff
  - Stairway Guides
  - In pairs or alone
  - Assisting passengers
  - Keeping calm
  - Looking confident





- Hotel and Entertainment Staff
- In charge of a Muster Station
- Up to 800 passengers





Hotel and Entertainment Staff





- Hotel and Entertainment Staff
- Moving a disabled "passenger"
- > Using an Evacu8 chair
- > Easy on a level surface





- Hotel and Entertainment Staff
- > Harder work on a stair
- Lifts may be out of action





Hotel and Entertainment Staff



- Boundary Cooling
- Hoses are "charged"
- Hoses are heavy
- Requires team work
- > Water jet is powerful



Hotel and Entertainment Staff

- Not all jobs are physically demanding
- > His job is to search cabin
- > Then report it is empty





- Hotel and Entertainment Staff
- > Here we see a stretcher party evacuating an ill or injured person to a boat
- Stretcher party is made of mainly hotel staff







- DOCTORS and MEDICAL STAFF
- > May need to Triage
- No emergency service to call
- Limited resourses
