Thank you for your email of 5 June 2014 in which you requested the following information:

"I would like details of the number of positive drug tests there have been in the armed forces for 2011 and 2013.

I would like the answer broken down by corps or regiment in the case of the Army and by the class of drug."

We are treating your correspondence as a request for information under the Freedom of Information Act 2000. I can confirm that the MOD holds information within the scope of your request.

The information is contained in Annexes A and B to this letter. Please note that as Part 2 of your request relates to Army Corps, the data at Tables C and F is specific to Army personnel. The other tables contain tri-Service data. Please note that some individuals have returned more than one positive result.

In accordance with the Data Protection Act and our obligations in relation to the protection of confidentiality when handling personal data, the figures provided have been rounded to the nearest 10, where "-" denotes zero, "~" denotes a number less than or equal to five. When rounding up to the nearest 10, numbers ending in 5 have been rounded to the nearest multiple of 20 to prevent systematic bias. Due to the rounding methods used, totals may not always equal the sum of the parts.

The misuse of drugs in the Armed Forces is inconsistent with Service life and our policy can be described as 'zero tolerance'. Any Serviceman/woman found to have been taking drugs can expect to be discharged, although 'zero tolerance' does not bind the Forces to discharge as its only response to drug misuse. If there are exceptional circumstances and the chain of command can provide a justification for the unusual response of retention, then it will be considered.

If you are not satisfied with this response or wish to complain about any aspect of the handling of your request, then you should contact me in the first instance. If informal resolution is not possible and you are still dissatisfied then you may apply for an independent internal review by contacting the Deputy Chief Information Officer, 2nd Floor, MOD Main Building, Whitehall, SW1A 2HB (e-mail CIO-FOI-IR@mod.uk). Please note that any request for an internal review must be made within 40 working days of the date on which the attempt to reach informal resolution has come to an end.

If you remain dissatisfied following an internal review, you may take your complaint to the Information Commissioner under the provisions of Section 50 of the Freedom of Information Act. Please note that the Information Commissioner will not investigate your case until the MOD internal review process has been completed.
