Profile of Large Retail Chains

Table 1 below summarises how large retailers are split between activity sectors:

While developing the methodology and during the comparison stage of the project we identified that some of the convenience and supermarket stores belonging to what we thought were chain

retailers are actually a special type of franchise called a 'symbol' group². Within these retailers the energy management of the store remains in the control of the store owner; they retain their independence, with no dictation on behaviours from a central source. We had previously decided that because these stores would operate similarly to other independent stores they should be excluded from our sample of large retailers, but during the main stage of the project we identified others and opted to extend this approach.

Excluding symbol groups³ (some of which will have emerged and been interviewed within the small / medium chains quotas⁴), we were aware of a number of food and mixed retailers operating more than 100 premises in the UK:

² Such as Londis and Costcutter. A form of franchise, symbol groups do not own or operate stores, but act instead as suppliers to independent grocers and small supermarkets, producing pseudo-chain stores which trade under a common banner. Symbol groups provide fascias, branding and business support to individual convenience store retailers for an annual fee. Unlike other forms of franchise, symbol groups have developed primarily by selling their services to existing stores, rather than by actively developing new retail outlets.

³ Still including retailers like Spar who operate some stores centrally and some as franchises.

In addition to the food and mixed retailers in the table above, we also identified other large chain food retailers that weren't captured based on their Experian pH ID⁶. After confirming these were within the scope of the work, we proceeded to include them in our sample.

⁵ Co-operative societies only appeared in the pH large retailer data if they had more than 100 stores within that regional society, with other regional societies not appearing here. For the purposes of this project all Cooperative Food outlets were treated as a single entity, covering all 3,300 food retail stores they operate collectively.

⁶ Such as frozen food retailers like Iceland and Farmfoods, and sandwich retailers.
