The Brussels Card

The card gives you entrance into 30 major museums and free city transport on the metro, tram and bus STIB. It is available in 24hrs (\in 20), 48hrs (\in 28) or 72hrs (\in 33). It also provides discounts for other attractions, some shops and restaurants. Buying online saves \in 1 on the price.

A booklet with 10 vouchers that can be exchanged for entry into many museums and attractions. It costs €18 for 10 vouchers and can be purchased from Tourist Information at the Grand Place.

Travel Information

Brussels has an integrated bus, tram and metro system. Tickets can be bought at metro stations and most newsagents. You will need to get your ticket stamped before travelling at the machines at the entrances to the metro stations or inside the buses and trams. You can buy various ticket options including five or ten journey tickets and a two person weekend ticket. Children under 6 travel for free when with an adult with a valid ticket (maximum of 4 children per adult). Trams and buses only stop on request.

Metro

The Metro has 4 lines and trains travel every 10 - 15 minutes. There are over 60 works of art on the platforms and corridors of the stations including a life sized mural of Tintin and friends at Stockel Station. Please check how close the recommended station is to your chosen destination as sometimes they can be some distance away.

Bicycle

There are some bike paths that are separated from the traffic. Maps and information can be found at <u>www.bicycle.irisnet.be</u>

Villo is a system of automated stations for short term bike hire. You need to subscribe which can be daily (\in 1.50), weekly (\in 7) or for a year (\in 30) and then you are charged depending on the time you choose, either 30mins (free), 60mins (\in 0.50), 90mins (\in 1.50) or 120mins \in 3.50. The idea is use a bike from one of the Villo stations, when you get to your destination you return the bike to the nearest station and then take a new one when you continue your journey. Comic Strip Murals

There are over 40 comic-strip murals throughout the old city centre. Tintin – Rue l'Etuve Le Chat – Blvd du Midi Herge's Peeping Policeman – Rue Haute.

Manneken Pis

This bronze fountain statue of a little boy has become a national symbol for Belgium. He has been given numerous costumes and now has over 740 outfits, some of which can be seen in the Maison du Roi which is opposite. He has been kidnapped several times and hasn't always been recovered! You can find him on the corner of Rue de l'Etuve & Rue du Chene.

Galleries St-Hubert

This covered gallery which houses shops (including many chocolate shops and cafes) was opened in 1847 by King Leopold 1 and formed Europe's first shopping arcade. The glass roof is 18m high and the galleries are split into 2, the Galerie du Roi (King's arcade) and Galerie de la Reine (Queen's arcade). Rue du Marche-aux-Herbes 1000 Brussels

Carpet of Flowers

The first carpet of flowers was laid on the Grand Place in 1971. Every 2 years, on the weekend of 15th August, a different carpet is created, made up of approx 800,000 begonias grown in the region of Gent. The next event is in 2012.

National Botanical Garden of Belgium

Situated 12km north of Brussels, just off the ring road. It has 93 hectares and based around 2 lakes. It includes Kasteel Van Boechout, a moated castle that Leopold II gave to his sister. There are 13 connecting green houses, a herb garden, an outdoor medicinal garden and a café and shop. www.botanicgarden.be

Art Nouveau

Brussels excels in Art Nouveau architecture. Some of the best examples include:

<u>Café Falstaff</u> The interior of this café was designed by Horta disciple Houbion Rue Henri Mau's 17.

<u>Musee Horta</u> These 2 adjoining houses, built between 1898 and 1901, were designed by Victor Horta who also lived there until 1919.
