
What do these statistics show? A National Insurance Number (NINo) is generally required by any adult overseas national looking to work or claim benefits / tax credits in the UK. As such they show a count – by individual nationality - of the number of NINo's registered to adult non-UK nationals each quarter, irrespective of the length of stay in the UK. The NINo statistics are not a count of the number of adult non-UK nationals currently residing in the UK

Main stories

741 thousand NINo's registered in the year to September 2017: a 10% decrease on the previous year

What you need to know

These statistics are designated as official statistics – see Status: Official statistics

What can you use these figures for?

 $\sqrt{}$ they provide a 100% count of foreign nationals registering for a NINO in a quarter; what their nationality was at the time of registering and where they registered.

What you cannot use these figures for:

X As a count of quarterly or annual migration to the UK.

X The number of foreign nationals who have started work or are currently in work.

X The number of foreign nationals who are currently in the UK

This summary contains statistics on National Insurance Numbers (NINo) allocated to adult overseas nationals, covering the period from January 2002 to September 2017.

The NINo statistics show the number of people registering for a NINo in order to work or to claim benefits / tax credits and are one of a number of supplementary measures produced by Government of inmigration to the UK.

The statistics are published as part of the scheduled timetable for the release of cross-Government migration statistics. The <u>Migration Statistics Quarterly Report (MSQR)</u> is a summary of the quarterly releases of official international migration statistics by the Office for National Statistics (ONS).

Comparisons with other sources of migration:

NINo statistics are not a direct measure of long term migration and therefore are not directly comparable with ONS long-term estimates of immigration. On 7 March 2016, the ONS published an <u>information note</u> explaining the reasons why long-term international immigration figures from the International Passenger Survey (IPS) could differ from the number of NINo registrations. This was followed by an <u>analytical paper</u> presenting analysis that has been undertaken across government to help understand why the 2 series are showing different trends, with focus on EU migration.



Where in the world are people registering from?


Registrations to EU nationals have continued to fall.

NINo registrations (thousands) to EU nationals in the year to September 2017



Outside of the EU, South Asia has the most registrations

Registrations (thousands) in the year to September 2017 by world area



- In the year to September 2017, there were 548,000 NINo registrations by EU nationals (down 13% on the previous year) and 192,000 by non-EU nationals (down 2% on the previous year.
- Registrations across all EU sub groups have decreased:
 - EU15 down 10% to 208.000
 - EU8 down 24% to 126,000
 - EU2 down 7% to 211,000
- Registrations to EU8 nationals now account for 23% of all EU registrations, this is down from 74% in 2007.

Note: There was a sharp rise in NINo registrations in 2014 following the removal of restrictions on work for EU2 citizens. Some of this is reflecting individuals who were residing in the UK prior 2014 and would only have been able to register for a NINo after that date (see arrival to registration analysis on EU2 nationals).

Top 5 individual nationalities, registrations in year to September 2017 (thousands) and the % change from previous year.



Nationalities with the largest increases in registrations in the year to September 2017 are: Bulgaria (see above). Eritrea up 56% to 3,000, Greece up 8% to 15,000 and Iran up 33% to 4,000.

Where in the UK are people registering?

Almost half of all registrations are in London or the South East

Status: Official statistics

National Insurance number (NINo) allocations to adult overseas nationals and nationality at point of NINo registration of Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) working age benefit recipients (NINo benefit claimants) are no longer badged as National Statistics. The statistics continue to be published as Official Statistics following Office for Statistics Regulation reassessment of the statistics.
