

1) The current total number of trainee licence holders

Our records show that as of 1 September 2012 there were 2,057 trainee licence holders.

2) The total number of ADI part one tests conducted between 1 April and 31 July 2012 also showing the number passing and the pass rates.

In the table below, you can find the number of ADI part one tests conducted, the number of tests passed and the pass rate for the period of 1 April to 31 July 2012.

3) The current total number of official register of driving instructor trainers (ORDIT) registered organisations and the current total number of ORDIT registered trainers

As of 6 September 2012, there were 529 driving instructor trainers at 259 organisations that were ORDIT registered.

4) The current total number of potential driving instructor (PDI) details held by DSA

We currently hold the details of 97,647 PDIs.

5) The total number who have registered in the past two years and have not yet qualified and then broken down into:

- a) not passed ADI part one**
- b) passed ADI part one but not passed ADI part two**
- c) passed ADI part two but not passed ADI part three**

Our records show details of 12,368 individuals who applied to start the qualifying process between 7 September 2010 and 6 September 2012 but have yet to qualify. Out of these 12,368 individuals:

- 6,605 have not passed the ADI part one test
- 3,486 have passed the ADI part one test but not the ADI part two test
- 2,277 have passed the ADI part two test but not the ADI part three test

6) The number of criminal records bureau (CRB) checks conducted on potential driving instructors (PDIs) between 1 April 2012 and 31 July 2012

Between 1 April and 31 July 2012, 2,096 CRB checks were conducted on PDIs.
