Thank you for your correspondence dated 16 November 2011, which has been considered to be a request for information in accordance with the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (FOIA). Your request has been passed to my department and I have been asked to respond.

You asked the following questions:

- 1.(a) "How many Army, Royal Marines, Royal Navy and RAF personnel tested positive in compulsory drug tests in 2009? Please give the figures by unit/regiment where possible. (b) Please break down these positive tests by drug type (e.g six personnel tested positive for heroin; 10 tested positive for cocaine; three tested positive for heroin and cocaine; 16 tested positive for cannabis; nine tested positive for cocaine and cannabis etc.) (c) How many Armed Forces personnel who tested positive for drugs in 2009 have been dismissed as a result".
- 2.(a) "How many Army, Royal Marines, Royal Navy and RAF personnel tested positive in compulsory drug tests in 2010? Please give the figures by unit/regiment where possible. (b) Please break down these positive tests by drug type (e.g six personnel tested positive for heroin; 10 tested positive for cocaine; three tested positive for heroin and cocaine; 16 tested positive for cannabis; nine tested positive for cocaine and cannabis etc.) (c) How many Armed Forces personnel who tested positive for drugs in 2010 have been dismissed as a result".
- 3.(a) "How many Army, Royal Marines, Royal Navy and RAF personnel tested positive in compulsory drug tests in 2011 so far? Please give the figures by unit/regiment where possible. (b) Please break down these positive tests by drug type (e.g six personnel tested positive for heroin; 10 tested positive for cocaine; three tested positive for heroin and cocaine; 16 tested positive for cannabis; nine tested positive for cocaine and cannabis etc.) (c) How many Armed Forces personnel who tested positive for drugs in 2011 have been dismissed as a result".

The Armed Forces do not tolerate the taking of illegal drugs within their ranks, as it is incompatible with military service and reduces operational effectiveness. All Service

personnel are subject to random compulsory drug testing. Providing a positive result, indicating the presence of illegal substances, will almost certainly result in an administrative discharge. These measures are well known and are a condition of Service.

The Compulsory Drug Testing (CDT) information you have requested in respect of the three Services has been compiled in the attached tables. Turning to your request regarding a breakdown by Ship, Regiment and Squadron, Section 40(2) of the FOIA provides an exemption from disclosing information about identifiable individuals where it would breach the Data Protection Act 1998. The Act contains a number of exemptions from the right of subject access to personal data which is information about a living individual from which that individual can be identified. In this case because the number of Service personnel that tested positive is small in number there is a risk that disclosure may cause these persons to be identified.

In regard to the respective CDT figures from all three Services, it should be noted the difference in the number of positive tests and the number of discharges is normal and is caused by a number of reasons such as individuals going absent, leaving the Service before the result, time lag between the test and the discharge due to investigations, overlap between years and some personnel being retained despite a positive test.
