1) How many qualified approved driving instructors (ADIs) are on the register currently?

There are currently 46,956 ADIs on the register. This information is based on a report run on 1 October 2011.

2) How many by percentage/or by number age graded one, two, three, four, five and six?

In the table below, you can find the number and percentage of ADIs that are graded one to six. This information is based on a report run on 1 October 2011.

Please note that the above information is based on the grade which the ADI was given at their last check test. The remainder of ADIs are either awaiting a check test to be arranged, awaiting a further check test after receiving an educational grading after joining the register or not due for a check test.

3) How many potential driving instructors (PDIs) are registered?

As of 7 October 2011, we held details of 96,289 PDIs. Most of those will no longer be pursuing a career as a driving instructor.

4) How many check tests have been carried out to date over the last 12 months?

5) How many ADIs have failed their check test over the last 12 months?

Between 1 October 2010 and 30 September 2011, 15,394 check tests were carried out on approved driving instructors. 1,447 of those ADIs received a substandard check test grade.

6) How many ADIs hare currently at their third attempt of a check test?

As of 1 October 2011, 55 ADIs were currently awaiting a third attempt for a check test.
